

Post Office Directory Extract 1855

Aldbourne



ALDBOURNE - is a township and parish in the Hundred of Selkley, Hungerford Union, North Wilts, formerly a market-town, and at which fairs were held, both of which have been wholly discontinued upwards of a century; it is pleasantly situated in a fertile valley, 7 miles from Hungerford station north-west, 66 from London, 9 from Swindon south-east, 7 from Marlborough north-east; containing a population of 1,622 and comprises 8,405 acres of land. It was formerly noted for the manufacture of fustians; but husbandry is now the only employment. The church is an ancient structure, in the Norman style, dedicated to St. Michael and St. Mary Magdalene. The living is a vicarage, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury, valued at £367 per annum. There are places of worship for Independents, Wesleyans and Primitive Methodists; also a National school.

Upper and Lower Upham are tithings, 2 miles north-west; Preston is a tithing 1½ miles south-east; Ford is half a mile south-east; Marridge, 1½ miles south-east; Crowood, 2 miles south-west; Loves 1½ miles south; Hillwood, 2 miles south-west; Dudmore Lodge, 2 miles west; Hickler Knoll, 2 miles north-west; Warren, 2 miles north-west; North Farm, 2 miles north; North Field, 1 mile north; East Leaze, 1½ miles north. Near Baydon Lottage is a farm.
