

Kellys Directory Extract 1889 Alderton



Alderton is a village and parish on the Gloucestershire border 9 miles north-west from Chippenham railway station and 8 south-west from Malmesbury in the North Western division of the county, Chippenham hundred, Malmesbury petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Chippenham, archdeaconry of Bristol and diocese of Gloucester and Bristol. The church of St. Giles underwent considerable repair about 1845; it is of stone, in the Early English style and has a chancel, nave, south aisle, north transept, south porch, and spire with 5 bells; there are 270 sittings. The register dates from the year 1606. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £150, in the gift of Sir John Neeld, Bart, and held by the Rev. Josephus Glover, D.D., St. John's College, Cambridge. Sir. J. Need, Bart, D.L., J.P., of Grittleton, is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is loam; subsoil clay. The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots. The area is 1,587 acres; rateable value, £1,506; the population is 1881 was 125.

DUNLEY is 11/2 miles south-east.

School, built in 1845, for 100 children; average attendance 53; & has an endowment of £10 yearly, chargeable on the Neeld estates; Miss Emma Mary Stafford, mistress.
