ALLINGTON, near Amesbury, is a township, parish and village, 4 miles east-south-east from Amesbury, and 8½ from Salisbury north-east, in the Amesbury hundred and union, Salisbury county court district, South Wilts, diocese and archdeaconry, of Salisbury, deanery of Amesbury. The living is a rectory, value £236, in the gift of Lord Craven; the Rev. Fulwar William Fowle, M.A., is the present incumbent, and rural dean, Prebendary of Sarum and perpetual curate of Amesbury; the Rev. Edmund Fowle, B.A., is the curate. The church has been rebuilt, and was consecrated in 1851; it is a small edifice, comprising a chancel and nave, embracing the Norman, early English, and perpendicular styles of architecture. Here is a small Primitive Methodist chapel. In 1851, the population was 88; the acreage, 936. J. H. C. Wyndham, Esq., is lord of the manor.
