Allington

Allington (near Amesbury) is a parish and village in the Southern division of the county, Amesbury hundred and union, Salisbury county court district, diocese and archdeaconry, and Amesbury rural deanery, 4 miles east-south-east from Amesbury, 8½ north-east from Salisbury, and 2½ north from Porton station.

The church of St. John the Baptist was rebuilt and consecrated in 1851; it is a small edifice, with square tower and 3 bells, and comprises a chancel and nave, embracing the Norman, Early English, and Perpendicular styles. The register dates from 1655. The living is a rectory, yearly value £236, in the gift of Lord Craven, and held by the Rev. Fulwar William Fowle, M.A., of Merton College, Oxford, rural dean, prebendary of Sarum, and vicar of Amesbury.

Here is a small Primitive Methodist chapel.

Mrs. King Wyndham is lady of the manor. The principal landowners are James Horne, Esq., and the Amesbury Charity trustees.

The soil is light loam on chalk; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat, barley, and oats.

The area is 936 acres; rateable value, £1,195; and the population in 187 was 93.
