

Post Office Directory Extract 1859 Ansty



ANSTY a township, village, and parish, 13½ miles west of Salisbury, and 7 north-east of Shaftesbury, in the hundred of Dunworth, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury, and deanery of Chalke, Hindon division, Tisbury union, South Wilts. The village is encompassed with downs on every side, excepting towards the north. It contains 1,342 acres, and, in 1851, 367 inhabitants. The whole of the parish belongs to Lord Arundel, of Wardour, who is likewise lord of the manor. The church of St. James was rebuilt about the year 1842; it is in the form of a cross, of small dimensions, but very neat; it has no tower, but a small belfry containing 1 bell. Nearly adjoining the churchyard, to the north, is a pile of old buildings, now occupied as a farm house and barns, supposed to have belonged to the abbey of Shaftesbury. The living is a donative, valued at £22 10s, in the gift of Lord Arundel. The incumbent is the Rev. John Harman Samler, M.A., of Pembroke College, Oxford, who resides in the adjoining parish of Swallowcliff, of which he is also the incumbent. The earliest register bears date 1654.

The National school is in Swallowcliffe. There is a Roman Catholic school, supported by Lord Arundel.

Catholic school, Miss Martha Roberts, mistress.
