

Post Office Directory Extract 1875 **Bratton**



Bratton is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1845. It is within the parliamentary borough of Westbury, in the Northern division of the county, Westbury civil parish, union, county court district, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury, rural deanery of Wylye, 3 miles east-by-north from Westbury, and 111½ from London.

The church of St. James is of stone, in the Early English style, consisting of square tower containing 4 bells, chancel, nave, transepts, and aisles. It was restored, re-seated, and newly roofed in 1860, at a cost of about £900, from designs by the architects, Scott and Wyatt. There are several stained windows, one at the western end, representing the four greater prophets and the four evangelists, and the eastern window representing the Birth, Death and Resurrection. The church will seat 200 persons. The register dates from 1542. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £300. The vicarage house was erected in 1863, at a cost of £1,600, on ground given by the Marquis of Bath. The living is in the gift of the vicar of Westbury, and held by the Rev. Richard Pyper, M.A., of Downing College, Cambridge.

There are National and British schools; also a Baptist and a small Wesleyan chapel.

Wool spinning and carding are carried on, and there is an iron foundry, where agricultural implements are manufactured.

The Marquis of Bath is lord of the manor and principal landowner.

The soil is green sand; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat and there are numerous apple orchards

The area is 3,574 acres; rateable value, £4,823; and the population in 1871 was 697.
