
## The Colletts of Barn Bridge


Dinah Collett (1911-1955) A tragic and most sad death



Dinah Collett, pictured above with her husband Gerald, and daughter Mary (born 1946), must surely be one of the saddest stories in the Moravian burial-ground in east Tytherton. The photograph is likely to have been taken shortly before her death, by suicide, at the age of 44. What led such a beautiful and attractive woman to do such a thing? We know that, some time before she gassed herself, that she had been in a motor accident. It may also be that she suffered from severe post-natal depression that contemporary treatments had not successfully resolved. Both of these factors could be implicated, but most probably we shall never completely know. Gerald, who loved wild flowers and photography, married again, but some years later. He always kept photographs of his tragic Dinah, whom he must have loved deeply. Dinah is buried near to her Father, Walter Pocock, and her mother, Emily Marion Pocock (*née* Long).

Br Collett died this afternoon after a comparatively short illness. Three weeks before he was present at the morning service. He was most faithful in his attendance at the Sanctuary - in the work of the Sunday school - & his service on the Committee. The funeral service was held in our Church on Friday 25th Feb & the interment took place at Melksham.





Alice Maude Collett (c. 1869-1949, *née* Bown) was the mother of Thomas Gerald Collett, and is buried at East Tytherton. The family lived in Barn Bridge (*below*), East Tytherton



(*Above*): We cannot positively identify all these people, but it appears that Olive Collett (died aged 26, in 1920) is on the left, with her stepmother (who married William James Collett 15<sup>th</sup> September, 1909), Alice Maude Collett (standing, centre). The baby could be Thomas Gerald Collett (born April, 1911). If so, Alice was about 43, and Olive 18. The location is *Barn Bridge*. The woman holding the baby is probably a nurse, rather than a relative – she is the only person in what appears to be in a one-piece uniform. Could this have been Nurse Annie Turk, from Calne?



(*Above*): *Barn Bridge* before World War I. The figure on the right, on massive enlargement, seems to show a beard. Could this be William James Collett?



(*Above*): *Barn Bridge* between the wars. The young man to the extreme left, may be Gerald Collett. Enlargement seems to show a boy of about 12-13 years, and a man of 25-30 years. Could this be Gerald with (half-brother) Gilbert Collett? The 'parting' of the boy is on the same side as Gerald's. If this surmise is correct, then this picture was taken in around 1922-23. Remains of the pre-1914 virginia creeper can still be seen on part of the left—hand side of the house — perhaps cleared in the previous 12 months or so?<sup>3</sup> Gilbert was Gerald's half-brother. Gerald's half-sister, Olive, was about 17 years older than him, so the above suggestion is not inconsistent.
