The man then fearing an alarm ran off. — Had the knife been sharp, the girl's throat must have been cut from ear to ear. The fellow has not been apprehended. — There is also a charge against the same person for having broken open a labourer's cottage at Tadpole, near Purton, and ransacked the place. It appears he was convicted at the Summer Assizes last year of house-breaking, and sentenced to six months imprisonment.
