## Brokenborough



**Brokenborough** is a village and parish adjoining Gloucestershire, within the parliamentary borough of Malmesbury, in the Northern division of the county, hundred, union, and county court district of Malmesbury, diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, archdeaconry of Bristol, and rural deanery of Malmesbury north, about 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> miles south-east from Tetbury, and 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> north-west from Malmesbury.

The church of St. John the Baptist is in the Early English style, and consists of a chancel, nave, and north aisle, with porch. The register dates from 1778. The living is a chapelry, which, together with that of Charlton, is annexed to the vicarage of Westport St. Mary, joint yearly value £520, with residence, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor, and held by the Rev. George Henry Hely Hutchinson, M.A., of Caius College, Cambridge.

Here is a small Charity school for boys and girls. This place was a Roman settlement. The Malmesbury Union Workhouse is situated in this parish.

The Earl of Suffolk and Berkshire is lord of the manor and chief landowner.

The soil is various. The chief crops are wheat, barley and roots.

The area of the parish is 2,552 acres; gross estimated rental, £4,867; rateable value, £3,842; and the population in 1871 was 411.

Quoewell is three quarters of a mile east.
