Chitterne



Chitterne All Saints is a parish, in the Southern division of the county, hundred of Heytesbury, Warminster union and county court district, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury, and rural deanery of Wylye, distant 8 miles east from Warminster, and 4 north-east from Heytesbury, situated on the road to Amesbury.

The church of Chitterne All Saints, with Chitterne St Mary, was erected in 1861 on a site presented by Walter Long, esq. It is of stone and flint, in squares, and is in the Perpendicular and Decorated styles. The aisles are connected with the nave by arcades, supported by five clustered piers. The chancel is of Bath stone, and has an apsidal end. There is a handsome square clock tower containing 3 bells. The church will seat about 330 persons. The old churches have been pulled down, with the exception of the chancels, which are now used for mortuary purposes. The register dates from 1731. The living is a vicarage, united to that of Chitterne St Mary, yearly value £319, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop and Dean and Chapter of Salisbury alternately, and held by the Rev. George Richards, M.A., of All Souls College, Oxford.

Here is a parochial school attended by about 100 scholars; also a Sunday school attended by about 250.

Sir Matthew R Onslow, bart., is lord of the manor. The principal landowners are the trustees of the late Richard Penruddocke Long, esq.

The soil is light chalk; subsoil, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley.

The area is 4,476 acres; gross estimated rental, £3,327; rateable value, £3,124; and the population in 1871 was 480.

Chitterne St Mary is a parish in the Southern division of the county, Heytesbury hundred, Warminster union and county court district, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury, and rural deanery of Wylye, adjoining the parish of Chitterne All Saints.

The church has been pulled down. The register dates from 1654. The living is a vicarage annexed to Chitterne All Saints, and held by the Rev. George Richards, M.A., of All Souls College, Oxford.

On the downs are barrows.

The trustees of Richard Penruddocke Long, esq., are lords of the manor and the principal landowners.

The soil is light chalk; subsoil, chalk and flint. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley.

The area is 1,198 acres; gross estimated rental, £1,451; rateable value, £1,285; the population in 1871 was 230.
