At the Bankruptcy Court on Thursday, there was an examination sitting and application for order of discharge under the bankruptcy of George Norton, of Codford St. Mary, painter and glazier. The liabilities amounted to 305 l. 2s. 3d. The accounts not having been filed in time to enable the Court to pass the bankrupt, an adjournment, with renewed protection, was ordered.

DAVID MAY'S BANKRUPTCY (1867)

At the Bankruptcy Court, on Thursday (before Mr Commissioner Winslow), there was an examination sitting and application for order of discharge under the bankruptcy of David May, of Codford St. Peter's, in the county of Wilts, horse trainer. Mr W. Walter Aldridge represented the official assignee and Mr R, James, solicitor, New Inn, supported the bankrupt, whose accounts were thus briefly summed up, viz. – DR. To creditors unsecured, 309l. 12s. Cr. By deficiency, 309l. 12s. The bankrupt stated that his expenditure had been 200 l. per annum for the past two years. His creditors chiefly reside at Codford St. Mary, Wylde and Warminster and he ascribes his bankruptcy to the following cause, viz. – “The support of my wife and large family and losses in my business as a horse trainer.” Mr Aldridge did not oppose on behalf of the official assignee and the Court passed the bankrupt's examination and granted him an order of discharge.
