Edwin Beattie was born in Coomera, Queensland in 1894 to parents John & Mary Elizabeth Beattie (nee Harding). He was a farmer from Coomera, Queensland, aged 22, when he enlisted on 28th March, 1916 with the 47th Infantry Battalion, 5th Reinforcements of the Australian Army. His service number was 2389 & his religion was Methodist. His next of kin was listed as his mother, Mrs Mary Elizabeth Beattie, Coomera, Queensland. Edwin's older brother George Beattie had enlisted the same day. He was aged 27 & also a farmer & his service number was 2388.

Pte Edwin Beattie & his brother both embarked from Brisbane on the *Seang Choon (A49)* on 19th September, 1916 & disembarked at Plymouth, England on 9th December, 1916.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. These were located in the Salisbury Plain & nearby areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Pte Beattie was admitted to Devonport Hospital from HMAT *Seang Choon* on 9th December, 1916 – sick (slight) - mumps. He was transferred to the Military Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 23rd December, 1916 with the diagnosis of influenza. He developed apparent signs of pneumonia on 24th December, 1916.

Pte Edwin Beattie died of pneumonia at 7.55 p.m. on 1st January, 1917 at the Military Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire.

From the burial report of Pte Edwin Beattie, he was buried at 2 p.m. on 3rd January, 1917 in Codford Cemetery Grave no 43.

Private E. Beattie is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 143.

And also the Coomera Shire Council Honour Board located in the Coomera CWA Memorial Hall.



Pte Edwin Beattie & his brother, Pte George Beattie are both remembered on their father's headstone located at Lower Coomera Cemetery, Queensland.



Pte Edwin Beattie was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Beattie's father — John Beattie (May, 1922 & August, 1922).
