





<p>He first enlisted with the 4th Dorset Regiment - Territorial Force at Mere, Wiltshire on 2nd October 1914. He was given the service number of 2540. Albert was discharged, after serving 31 days, in consequence of para 392 (iii) (c) King's regulations. The grounds for his discharge were for (iii) – "Not being likely to become an efficient soldier" (c) "Recruit within three months of enlistment considered unfit for service". He was recorded as being of good conduct. His discharge was approved at Dorchester on 24th February 1915.</p>							
<p>Albert Re-applied to join up and was accepted. He joined the Gloucestershire Regiment when enlisting at Warminster. He was given the rank of Private and Service Number of 23129. His records show that he was attached to 10th (Service) Battalion of Gloucestershire Regiment</p>							
<p>From the battalion war diaries, the 10th Battalion of the Gloucestershire Regiment was raised at Bristol in September 1914 as part of Kitchener's Third New Army and was attached to 26th Division. They moved to Salisbury Plain for training and by November 1914 had moved to billets in Cheltenham, Gloucestershire. They returned to Salisbury Plain in April 1915 to complete their training. They proceeded to France on 8th August 1915 and joined the 1st Brigade, 1st Division on the 17th August. They first saw action in Battle of Loos - the first day being 25th September 1915, when the 10th Battalion of Gloucestershire Regiment and other regiments attacked German trenches around the small French mining town of Loos near the Belgian border. The Battalion was decimated and the Battle of Loos effectively ended on 28th September. The British suffered a loss of 50,000 casualties while the Germans loss was around 25,000. It is estimated that in total just over 6,300 soldiers died on the first day - 25th September 1915.</p>							
<p>Private Albert Ward was entitled to the 1915 Star, British War & Victory Medals. His Medal Index Card shows he had entered a Theatre of War - France on 9th August 1915 and was killed less than 7 weeks later.</p>
