Andrew had served with the Senior Cadets for 12 months.							
Private Wishart was admitted to hospital on 14th December 1915 suffering from Gonorrhoea while stationed at Trentham Camp, near Wellington, New Zealand. He was discharged on 12th January 1916.							
Private Wishart embarked with 11th Reinforcements Details (to make up shortages in 10th Reinforcements) Canterbury Infantry Battalion, C Company from Wellington, New Zealand on 1st April 1916. Two ships embarked that day - HMNZT (49) Maunganui & HMNZT (50) Tahiti carrying a total of 2,222 men. He disembarked at Suez on 2nd May 1916.							
He embarked from Alexandria for Marseilles, France on 20th May 1916. He was attached on strength at Etaples, France on 28th May 1916 and joined his Battalion in the field on 28th July 1916.							
Andrew was wounded in action on 27th September 1916 in the left thigh and was admitted to XV Corps Collecting Station on 28th September 1916. He was then admitted to 36th Casualty Clearing Station and finally admitted to 8th General Hospital at Rouen on 28th September 1916.							
He then embarked for England on the Hospital Ship Panama on 2nd October 1916. He was then admitted to No. 1 N.Z. General Hospital at Brockenhurst, Hampshire on 3rd October 1916							
Andrew was attached on strength to Base Depot at Codford Army Camp on 6th December 1916							
He was admitted to No. 3 New Zealand General Hospital at Codford on 24th January 1917 with mild Bronchitis. He was transferred to the Venereal Section of the Hospital on 17th March 1917 and on 4th April transferred back to General Hospital with Pleurisy.							
He was reported seriously ill on 9th May 1917. His condition improved before being reported as dangerously ill with Jaundice on 22nd June 1917. Andrew Wishart was still recorded as dangerously ill on 1st July 1917.
