Compton Chamberlain

Compton Chamberlain is a parish and village, in South Damerham Hundred, Wilton Union, South Wilts, 6 miles W. by S. from Wilton, and 10 from Salisbury.

The church (St Michael) is a small Gothic edifice, with square tower and one bell; the interior contains a tablet to the memory of Colonel John Penruddock, who was beheaded by Cromwell's orders.

The living is a vicarage in the gift of Charles Penruddock, Esq., and held by the Rev. John Ravenshaw Wood. The earliest register bears date in 1538.

The area is 2,130 acres and the population, in 1861, was 348.
