

FASHIONABLE WEDDING NEAR WESTBURY

The village of Dilton Marsh, near Westbury, Wilts, was en fete yesterday morning on the occasion of the marriage of Mr. Meyrick, only son of Sir George Meyrick, Bart., of Hinton Admiral, Hants, and Bodorgan, Anglesey, to Miss Jacintha Phipps, youngest daughter of the late Charles Paul Phipps, of Chalcot, M.P. for Westbury. The church was crowded with guests and visitors, and admission to the building was only gained by ticket. The marriage service was conducted by the vicar, the Rev, Charles Holt Wilson of Dilton Marsh, assisted by Rev. Edward Harland, vicar of Colwick, uncle of the bridegroom. The bridegroom's best man was Mr. Smyth, late of the Rifle Brigade: and the bride was supported by eight bridesmaids, viz., Miss Phipps sister of the bride; Miss Meyrick and Miss Effie Meyrick sisters of the bridegroom; Miss Charlesworth, Miss Evelyn, Miss Margaret, Miss Norah, and Miss Mary Phipps nieces of the bride. The bride was given away by her brother, Mr. Charles N. P. Phipps, M. P. and a large number of friends assembled afterwards at Chalcot for the wedding breakfast. Mr. and Mrs. Meyrick left Chalcot early in the afternoon for Bodorgan, where they intend to spend their honeymoon. The wedding presents were most numerous and costly, and amongst the donors were the names of the Marquis of Bath, Lord Heytesbury, the members of the Hampshire Hunt, villagers of Dilton Marsh etc. The Westbury Railway Station was elegantly decorated in the afternoon by the stationmaster, Mr. S. Martin, and employees, and as the train steamed out of the station the bride and bridegroom's departure was announced by ringing cheers.

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
