ACCIDENTS

ACCIDENT,- On Monday evening a man named Henry Saunders was knocked down by a horse and cart and had his left leg broken. The man, who is very deaf, not hearing the vehicle coming did not get out of the way. He was removed to the Salisbury Infirmary.

ACCIDENT TO A CHILD.- On Thursday morning a child named Frank Whatley was playing in the Railway Station yard, where his father was employed, when by some means or other he was crushed by the wheel if a wagon containing about two tons of coal. He was taken to Salisbury Infirmary suffering from considerable bruises to the chest.

ACCIDENT.- On Tuesday last Samuel Haines had the tops of his fingers of his left hand removed by getting them into a chaff cutter while at work for Mr Darling. He was afterwards admitted into the Salisbury Infirmary.

ACCIDENT TO A DRIVER.- On Sunday last, as William Burnitt, of Dinton, was driving a horse and trap to Coombe the horse stumbled and he was thrown out, and got kicked, his right leg being broken. A friend who was with him assisted him, and took him to the Salisbury Infirmary.
