The South Wilts Hounds

The immediate vicinity of Salisbury was the scene of a fox-chase on Monday last. The hounds of Wm. Wyndham, Esq., of Dinton, met on the Salisbury Race-course, and quickly found a brace of foxes, one of which was pursued, and took refuge in the withybed, at the Fisherton end of the city, - whence he was speedily driven; but the scent not being very good, after dodging the *varmint* about for some time across the high roads to Wilton and Devizes, the approach of night put an end to the bloodless fray. The field was numerous, and comprised the Hon. Sidney Herbert, M.P., Lord G. Bentinck, Earl Bruce, Earl Shelburne, &c.

These hounds, consisting of some fifty couples, are to be sold at Dinton Kennels on the 17th April, by Messrs Tattersall. Coming from a cold scenting country, they are a capital working pack, and have been bred with great care. Capt. Jarrett gave Mr Pain £1000 for them. Orbell, who has been hunting the South Wilts for the last seven years, is seeking a place, and so good a man should not be long without one – *Field*.
