Augustus Charles BRANDER

Augustus Charles Brander was born at Dalton, near Yass to parents William Alexander & Lucy Ann Brander (nee Cannon). His birth was registered in 1885 in the district of Gunning, NSW. He was a 29 year old, single, Labourer from Ballimore, NSW when he enlisted at Dubbo on 18th October, 1916 with the 3rd Infantry, 23rd Reinforcements of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 6951 & his religion was Presbyterian. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs L Brander of Parks Street, Ryde, NSW. Augustus stated on his Attestation Papers that he had previously been rejected as medically unfit due to his eyesight.

Pte Augustus Charles Brander embarked from Sydney on HMAT *Benalla* (A24) on 9th November, 1916 & disembarked at Devonport, England on 9th January, 1917.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

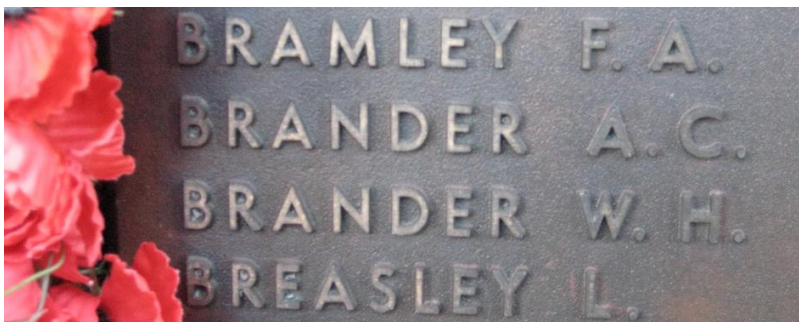
Pte Augustus Charles Brander was admitted sick to Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire on 5th February, 1917 & reported seriously ill on 7th February, 1917.

Pte Augustus Charles Brander died at 11.25 a. m. on 16th February, 1917 in Fargo Military Hospital of Pneumonia.

A death for Augustus C. Brander, aged 29, was registered in the March quarter, 1917 in the district of Amesbury, Wiltshire.

Pte Augustus Charles Brander was buried on 19th February, 1917 in Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire in plot number 199.

Private A. C. Brander is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 35.

Pte Augustus Charles Brander was entitled to British War Medal only. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Pte Brander's mother – Mrs Lucy Ann Brander of Windsor, NSW (August, 1922 & January, 1922).

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private Augustus Charles Brander – service number 6951 as being 29 years old & served with 3rd Battalion Australian Infantry. He was the son of William Alexander and Lucy Ann Brander of Morrison Road, Ryde, NSW. Born at Dalton, New South Wales.

Pte Brander died of pneumonia on 16th February, 1917 & was buried in Plot 199 at Durrington Cemetery. Pte Ayliffe died of Bronchitis & Pneumonia on 19th February, 1917 & was buried in Plot 206 of Durrington Cemetery.

RYDE – DEATH OF TWO SOLDIER BROTHERS

Private Augustus Brander, son of Mrs Brander of Parkes Street, Ryde, has died in hospital in England from pneumonia. His brother, Wallace, died in Egypt about 18 months ago. The late Private Brander was a brother of Mrs Willings of Ryde.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at Durrington War Graves Cemetery. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.
