Good Training For The Campaign Of Mud And Water ! Canadian Transport In A Flooded Road At Larkhill

The Canadians encamped on Salisbury Plain – over 30,000 men are divided among four main camps and several smaller ones, including those at Westdown North, Westdown South, Bastard, Bulford, Pond Farm, Larkhill and Sling Plantation. Some of the camps are seven or eight miles distant from each other, and the roads between, owing to the rainy weather, have for many weeks been in an extra ordinary state of muddiness, and in some places completely flooded and resembling shallow canals rather than highways. Camp life and transport work under such conditions are naturally far from pleasant, but the Canadians take their hardships cheerfully, and console themselves with the reflection that it is all good training for the campaign as at present waged in a sea of mud. *(Photo, Sport and General)*
