Durrington



Durrington is a parish and village, distant 2 miles N.W. from Amesbury, and 10 miles N.W. from Salisbury, in Amesbury hundred and union, South Wilts. The living is a perpetual curacy, value £130, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Winchester; the Rev. C. S. Ruddle, M.A., is the incumbent, and is also the rector of Milston. The church is dedicated to All Saints. There is a parochial school, supported by voluntary contributions and a chapel for Independents. The population in 1861 was 440; the acreage 2,682. The manor is held by the Warden and Fellows of Winchester College.
