Durrington

As Mr C. Berrett, late of Kimpton, was returning from Salisbury market to his new residence at Durrington, Wilts, a few days since, about half-past 8 in the evening, he was stopped by three ruffians, who darted from the hedge; one of them seized the bridle of the horse which he was riding, and the others requesting him to "hold hard," immediately commenced as most unmerciful attack on him with their heavy bludgeons.
