FLIGHT ROUND SALISBURY CATHEDRAL

M. Tetard, the French airman, made a flight round Salisbury Cathedral on Saturday on a biplane manufactured by the British and Colonial Aeroplane Company (Limited), of Bristol.

The airman left the company's shed, which is situated on War Department land at Durrington, Salisbury Plain, soon after 10 o'clock, and steered straight for the Cathedral, nearly ten miles away. He safely rounded the spire, which is 400 ft. high, some 200 ft. above.

The return flight to Stonehenge was safely accomplished, the journey of about 23 miles having occupied about an hour. M. Tetard was cheered by thousands of people as he flew over Salisbury. This is the first time that an aeroplane has been in flight round Salisbury Cathedral.
