John Joseph McCALLAM

John Joseph McCallam was born at Charters Towers, Queensland around 1891. He was a 24 year old, single, Labourer from Littlemore Siding, Boyne Valley Line, Queensland when he enlisted on 5th January, 1916 with the Mining Corps of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 2606 & his religion was Roman Catholic. His next of kin was listed as his uncle – Mr John Young of Littlemore Siding, Boyne Valley Line, Queensland. Pte McCallam was transferred to the 3rd Pioneer Battalion, 4th Reinforcements of the A.I.F. on 21st September, 1916.

Pte John Joseph McCallum embarked from Melbourne on HMAT *Port Melbourne (A16)* on 21st October, 1916 & disembarked at Devonport, England on 28th December, 1916.

Reinforcements were only given basic training in Australia. Training was completed in training units in England. Some of these were located in the Salisbury Plain & surrounding areas in the county of Wiltshire.

Private John Joseph McCallum was marched in from Australia to Larkhill.

Private John Joseph McCallum was admitted to Hospital on 1st January, 1917 for observation, seriously ill, as it was not yet determined his illness.

A Telegram was sent to Mr J. Young, noted as next-of-kin, on 21st January, 1917, stating that Pte John J. McCallam had been admitted to Fargo Military Hospital with a severe illness. A similar Telgram was sent again on 31st January, 1917. On the 12th February, 1917 a Telegram advising that Pte John McCallam was progressing favourably was sent to Mr John Young.

Private John Joseph McCallum died at 9.40 p.m. on 9^{th} March, 1917 at Fargo Military Hospital, Wiltshire from a Duodenal Ulcer.

A death for (Male) McCallum, aged 25, was registered in the March quarter, 1917 in the district of Amesbury, Wiltshire.

Private John Joseph McCallum was buried on 13th March, 1917 at Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire – Plot number 218 and has a Commonwealth War Graves Commission headstone.

Private J. J. McCallam is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 173.

Pte John Joseph McCallam was entitled to British War Medal only as he had not entered a Theatre of War. It appears that the next-of-kin listed for Pte McCallam was only a friend, not a blood relative & in response to a letter from Base Records sent on 29th April, 1921 – Mr Young replied that he was certain that the parents of the late Pte McCallam were dead & that he never heard of any brothers & sisters. The British War Medal, Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plague were sent to the "Untraceables Section".

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission lists Private John Joseph McCallam – service number 2606 as being 24 years old & served with 3rd Battalion Australian Pioneers. No family details are listed.

A War Pension was applied for by John Young - relationship to Late Pte John Joseph McCallum was stated as "None". The War Pension application was rejected on the grounds that "the claimant is not considered to be a dependent within the meaning of the War Pensions Act."

STATUTORY NOTICE TO NEXT OF KIN

RE JOHN JOSEPH McCALLAM, late of Brisbane, in the State of Queensland, Deceased.

Notice is hereby given that all persons claiming, to be next of kin of the above named John Joseph McCallam, late of Brisbane, in the State of Queensland, deceased, who died on or about the Sixth day of March, 1917, A.D., at Fargo, England, are hereby required to forward proof of their relationship to the PUBLIC CURATOR, Brisbane, on or before the Twenty-fifth day of April, 1918. And that after the expiration of the last mentioned date the Public Curator will proceed to distribute the assets of the said deceased amongst the parties entitled thereto, having regard only to the Claims of which he shall then have had notice.

Dated this Fifteenth day of February, 1918.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at Durrington War Graves Cemetery. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government.

A letter from Base Records, dated 25th July, 1921, to Mr J. Young advises that a letter from the Defence Dept. concerning an inscription on the headstone of the late Pte J. J. McCallam had not been answered & non-receipt of a reply within 21 days would have to be accepted as indicating that no further action was to be taken. Mr Young had already received several packages containing the personal belongings of the late Pte McCallam.
