

Memorial to Men of

1st Training Battalion, A.I.F. at Durrington Cemetery

The Memorial is to the men of the 1st Training Battalion, AIF who died on active service at Larkhill Camp. The Memorial is an obelisk made out of red granite located in Durrington Cemetery, Wiltshire, England, which is north-west of Durrington Village. The cemetery contains 252 war graves of which 141 are Australian. Most of the war graves are those of soldiers connected with the nearby Larkhill Camp. The Australian graves are to the right of a wall inscribed with the words "Their Name Liveth For Evermore".

A memorial to the men of the 1st Training Battalion, Australian Imperial Forces, has been erected at Durrington, near Amesbury. It takes the form of a massive obelisk and bases in rugged red Scotch granite, standing altogether 15ft. high.


