

HORTICULTURE IN FITTLETON 1800-1899

1851

South Wilts Horticultural Society. To the Rev. Mr. Philipps, Fittleton, second best pansies, best lettuces. **Hampshire Advertiser, Saturday, 21 June 1851**

1853

North Wilts Horticultural Society. A device – a table closely covered with flowers arranged with great taste and precision – attracted much notice, and received a prize: it was exhibited by Mr. Peck, gardener to the Rev. Mr. Phillips of Fittleton. Salisbury and Winchester Journal, Saturday, 10 September 1853

1856

Horticultural Show for the ragement of Cottage Gardening: On Tuesday last, August 5th, the show was held at Fittleton, and prizes were given for the best vegetables and fruits grown in the cottage gardens; and all the labourers (about 50) who sent anything to the show out of their gardens, had afterwards a substantial supper in the rector's (Rev. T. Pearse's) barn.

Avon Valley Horticultural Society. White ticket class: Neatest kept cottage garden above 12 perches in size: First – James Stevens of Fittleton. Salisbury and Winchester Journal, Saturday, 21 July 1866

1867

Avon Valley Horticultural Society. White Ticket Class. For the best cultivated and neatest kept cottage garden. Fittleton, James Stevens and James Yates. Salisbury and Winchester Journal, Saturday, 27 July 1867

1868

Avon Valley Horticultural Society. White ticket class. For the best cultivated and neatest kept cottage garden. Fittleton: James Stevens and Michael Spratt. Salisbury and Winchester Journal, Saturday, 18 July 1868

1869

Avon Valley Horticultural Society. White ticket class. For the best cultivated and neatest kept gardens – champion prize: Fittleton: James Yates and John Hayward. Salisbury and Winchester Journal, Saturday, 24 July 1869
