



## Parish of Great Chalfield

### ROLL OF HONOUR

A Roll of Honour for this little parish has been compiled by the Rector, The Rev. John Liddiard Cook, and a copy posted in a conspicuous position in the beautiful and interesting little church of All Saints, which has been most carefully restored by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Fuller. The record is one of the most honourable of the parochial records of the county: the population of the parish (which is best known for its fine 15th century house, lately restored to its original plan for Mr. Fuller under Mt. Brakspear's supervision) is 89 – that is, of course, reckoning every human being living in it; of these 16, nearly one-fifth, are in the service of the King.

The Rector has given a copy of the Roll to each house in the parish that prayer may be offered daily for each soldier or sailor by name, the church bell being rung at noon as a reminder: a copy has also been sent to each officer and man named on it.

So far the only casualty is that of Oliver Burgess, who is one of the prisoners of war of the 2nd Battalion of the Wiltshire Regiment.

The Roll, which was printed at The Wiltshire Gazette office, is headed by the name of the owner of the Manor House, Captain Robert Fleetwood Fuller, of the Royal Wilts Yeomanry, and the other names are as follows:-
