Whereas, the following Persons have ABSCONDED and left their Families chargeable to their respective Parishes :- viz.

SAMUEL CRAY, of the Parish of Warminster, blacksmith, aged 35 years, about 5ft. 7in. in height, dark hair and complexion. He has been lately residing at Twerton near Bath, and was for some time an inmate of the Bath Hospital, having broken his leg, which is somewhat swollen in consequence.

THOMAS SPAREY, of the Parish of Codford Saint Mary, labourer, aged 25, about 5ft. 9in., dark hair and complexion. He was in the employ of Mr Locke, of Ashton Gifford.

JAMES TOPP, also of the Parish of Codford St. Mary, labourer, aged 26 years, about 5ft. 9 or 10in., dark curly hair and complexion, long thin face, prominent forehead, and large under lip, which projects very much. He absconded in April last.

JOHN PENNY, of the parish of Heytesbury, woollorter, aged 30, about 5ft. 9in., in height, very light hair and complexion, inclination to corpulency, and of drinking habits.

Whoever will apprehend the above-named Paupers, and cause them to be delivered to the proper authorities in their respective Parishes, to be dealt with according to law, shall receive the sum of TWO GUINEAS each.
