

Post Office Directory Extract 1859 Hindon



Hindon, from which the Earl of Clarendon, takes his title as Baron of Hindon, is a township, parish, market and post town, and the centre of an agricultural district, mostly one straight street, near a quarter of a mile in length, standing on a gradual acclivity, on the high road from Salisbury to Taunton, 111 miles south-west from London by Salisbury, 123 by Warminster, 16 west of Salisbury, and 9 south of Warminster, in the hundred of Downton, Tisbury Union, South Wilts, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury, and deanery of Chalke. Silk winding and wool spinning were formerly carried on here to some extent, but all manufactures have now entirely disappeared.

On Holy Thursday, July 2, 1752, two-thirds of the town were destroyed by fire. It was an ancient borough, but only by prescription, and possessed a local government, having a bailiff and burgesses, and returned two members to Parliament; it was disfranchised at the passing of the Reform Bill in 1832, and is now a polling-place for the southern division of the county. The market is appointed to be held on a Thursday. There are fairs on the 27th of May and 29th of October. The parish contains 212 acres; population, 710. The town is chiefly the property of the Marquis of Westminster and Alfred Morrison, Esq. The living is a chapelry, value £75, in the gift of the Lord Chancellor; the Rev. Robert Greaves Walker is the incumbent.

The church, which is supposed to have been dedicated to St. John the Baptist, was built in the reign of Philip and Mary, probably about 1555, has a tower with 6 bells, and in 1836 was repaired and enlarged. The register commences 1665.

There is a Free School for boys and girls, which was built by Lord Calthorpe when lord of the manor. Here is the charity of James Ames, Esq., late surgeon of Hindon, who died June 9, 1828, and left by will £10 annually to the poor of this parish for ever, to be distributed by the overseers, in bread and clothing, on Christmas Eve.

There is a chapel belonging to the Independents, and one also for the Primitive Methodists. The houses are built chiefly of stone, raised from the quarry at Tisbury, in this locality. Coals are brought from the pits at Radstock, in Somerset.

Post Office – Miss Susannah Harrison, postmistress. Letters arrive by London & cross road mail cart at 7 a.m. & are dispatched at 6.45 p.m. by same conveyance. Box closes at 6.30 p.m. Money orders are issued & paid.
