

Robson's Directory Extract 1839 Hindon



Hindon is a borough and market-town possessing little to recommend it to notice. It chiefly consists of one long street, situated on a gentle declivity, 98 miles south-west from London, and 16 west from Salisbury, on the high road to Taunton, for travelling on which is a source of profit.

The greater part of the town was destroyed by fire in 1754. The silk and twist manufactures, formerly existing here, have given place to those of linen, dowlas, and bed-ticking.

There is a school, supported by Lord Calthorpe. It is a polling-place for the county, and a borough by prescription, governed by a bailiff and burgesses, and enjoyed a double representation in Parliament till disfranchised for notorious corruption by the Reform Act.

The marker, nearly disused, is on Thursday, and there are fairs on the 27th of May and 29th of October. The inhabitants are 921, and assessed property £745.

The church of St. John Baptist is a donative curacy of £75 a-year, in the gift of the Crown, but subordinate to the Rectory of East Knoyle, 3 miles to the south; which parish gave birth to Sir Christopher Wren.

Scattered about this neighbourhood are various remnants of antiquity, supposed to be indications of British habitation. Fonthill Abbey, 2 miles south-east, while in possession of the eccentric Mr Beckford, was one of the principal attractions for the county, for the extensive prospect from its elegant and loft tower, and the exquisite taste displayed, both in interior decoration and disposition of the grounds. But the celebrated tower could boast more beauty than solidity; scarcely had it passed into new hands when it fell into ruins. The estate is now dismembered, a wing only remains of the edifice, and on the banks of the magnificent lake a cloth manufactory is established. At Tisbury, 4 miles south-east are some excellent stone-quarries. The interior architecture f Tisbury church resembles, on a small scale, that of Westminster Hall. Wardour Castle, the seat of Lord Arundel, is in this parish; a splendid edifice, amidst undulated and well-wooded grounds, the most interesting object of which is the ivied ruin of the old castle, surrendered to the Parliament army by Blanch Lady Arundel after a severe siege; and subsequently destroyed, through the springing of a mine, by the noble proprietor himself, in order to dislodge the new tenants.
