

## Kellys Directory Extract 1898 Hullavington



HULLAVINGTON is a village and parish, 5 miles south-west from Malmesbury terminal station, on a branch of the Great Western railway and 7 north-by-west from Chippenham, in the North Western division of the county, Malmesbury union, county court district, petty sessional division and hundred (except the tithing of Surrendel, which is in the hundred of Chippenham), and in the rural deanery of Malmesbury and archdeaconry and diocese of Bristol. The line which the Great Western Railway are now (1898) constructing to connect Swindon with the Severn tunnel, via Wootten Bassett, passes a little north of the village. The church of St. Mary is a building of stone, consisting of chancel, nave of three bays, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower, rebuilt in 1880, and containing 2 bells: the porch, arches, columns and other parts are Transition Norman, and the north aisle has very good Early English windows: the church was restored in 1871, and affords 240 sittings. A lychgate was erected in the churchyard in 1897, by Meredith Meredith-Brown esq. J.P. in memory of his wife. The register dates from the year 1694. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value, £160, including 84 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of Eton College, and held since 1893 by the Rev. George Yonge M.A. of Trinity Hall, Cambridge. There is preserved at the vicarage, a portion of a chasuble of brown satin, embroidered in gold and silver thread; in the centre is a representation of Our Saviour on the Cross, with an angel on each side receiving the blood in a chalice; the rest is covered with figures of saints, cherubim and fleurs-de-lys. Here are Baptist, Congregational and Primitive Methodist chapels. Green's charity amounts to £4 13s. yearly, of which £2 13s. is for the education of poor children. The manorial rights and rectorial tithes, as well as most of the land, belong to Eton College: Sir Algernon W. Neeld bart. of Grittleton, is lessee under the college. The soil is brashy, on rock. The chief crops are wheat, barley and oats. The area is 3,302 acres; rateable value, £3,161; the population in 1891 was 543.

Surrendel is a tithing, 1½ miles west.
