

Inquisition

Imber

William Tynbury, Yeoman

Delivered into Court 28th May, 9 Charles I [1633].

Inquisition taken at New Sarum, 14th September, 8 Charles I [1632], before William Guydott, esq., escheator, after the death of William Tynbury, late of Brewham, co. Somerset, yeoman, by the oath of Anthony Davies, gent., John Thorpe, gent., George Acrigg, Giles Compton, Leonard Brown, Thomas Wilson, John Butcher, Ralphe Tomlyne, Robert Swerving, Richard Easton, Henry Page, Thomas Woollford, Bartholomew Foster, Thomas Hurcott, and William Earleyghe, who say that

William Tynbury was seised in his demesne as of fee of one messuage or tenement, one toft, two barnes, one garden, 120 acres of land, and 3 acres of pasture, and common of pasture for all beasts in **Imber, co. Wilts**, which are held by the king in chief by knight service, and are worth yearly, beyond remrises, 30s.

William Tynbury died 22nd December, 5 Charles I [1629], and Mary, now the wife of Philip Freake, gent., is his daughter and heir, aged 40 years and more
