Imber

Imber is a parish, in the Southern division of the county, Swanborough hundred, Warminster union and county court district, diocese of Salisbury, archdeaconry of Wilts, and rural deanery of Potterne, 6 miles east-by-north from Warminster, 7 south-east from Westbury station, 112 from London, and 4 north-east-by-east from Heytesbury.

The church of St. Giles is a neat edifice, in the Perpendicular style: it contains two stone effigies representing Crusaders, also the remains of a chapel. The living is a perpetual curacy, annual net value £124, with residence, in the gift of the Marquis of Bath, and held by the Rev. William Slatter, M.A., of Lincoln College, Oxford.

Here is a National School; also a place of worship for Baptists.

The soil is green sand; subsoil, chalk. The chief crops are wheat and pasture. The population in 1861 was 382; area, 3,033 acres; rateable value, £2,534.

BOWLS BARROW is 2 miles south-west, and there are other barrows.
