The Mansion is large and commodious, and the surrounding lawns afford the pupils ample scope for recreation and exercise. The fact of the aid of any medical gentleman not having been necessary, but with on exception, during the last *nine years*, is a sufficient proof of the salubrity of the situation. The number of pupils has generally averaged about forty.
