

Post Office Directory Extract 1849 Imber



Imber is a parish in the Hundred of Swanborough and Union of Warminster, 6 ½ miles north-east from Warminster and 4 north-east-by-east from Heytesbury.

The living is a perpetual curacy, in the archdeaconry and diocese of Salisbury, and in the patronage of the Marquis of Bath; the Rev. William Dyer, M.A., is the present incumbent. The church, dedicated to St. Giles, is a neat edifice, in the perpendicular style of architecture.

Here is a National School; also a place of worship for Baptists.

Population in 1841 was 405; area in acres, 2,990.
