Mr Codrington's Hounds will meet this day, at Knook; on Friday, at the Wheat Sheaf, Littleton; and on Monday, April 2, at Grovely West End: at 10 o'clock each day.

*(Salisbury and Winchester Journal – Monday 26 March, 1832)*

The Middleton Harriers will meet on Tuesday, at Lower Pertwood Farm; on Friday 27<sup>th</sup>, at Knook Barn; at 11 o'clock each day.

*(Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette – Thursday 19 December, 1839)*

The Middleton Harriers will meet on Tuesday Tytherington Pond; and on Friday, at Knook Village; at 11 o'clock each day.

The Heytesbury Harriers will meet on Monday the 9<sup>th</sup> February, at Haskin’s Penning; and on Thursday the 12<sup>th</sup> February, at Knook Knoll – at ½ past 11.

*The Heytesbury Harriers* – On Friday last, after two capital runs, and most of the field having had quantum sufficit, had left, except five, who generally see the day out – a third hare was found on Mr Redman’s down. She ran to near Erlestoke, when altering her course she doubled back to Wadman’s Copse on to Imber Road, and at the end of a 45 minutes hot pursuit, ran to the village for rescue, with the merry little pack close to her heels. She here bolted into Mr Bull’s Court, but finding no shelter, jumped at the window, and in a second attempt broke the pane and went through into the drawing room, and found her way into the cellar. Mr Parry determined not to give her up; and on enquiry, she was found sitting under a barrel, while the village peal sounded
