

Post Office Directory Extract 1875 Knook



Knook, a township, parish and village, on the banks of the Wylye, in the Southern division of the county, Warminster Union and county court district, hundred of Heytesbury, diocese and archdeaconry of Salisbury, and rural deanery of Wylye, 1 mile south-east from Heytesbury, 5 miles south-east from Warminster, and 119 from London.

The church of St. Margaret is a small ancient structure, in mixed styles; it has a chancel, nave, and a north porch, having a small tower rising out of it, with 1 bell. The register dates from 1687. The living is a vicarage, annexed to that of Heytesbury, joint yearly value £350, in the gift of the Bishop of Salisbury; the Rev. John Knight, M.A., of Queens' College, Cambridge.

Knook Castle is an earthwork on the brow of an eminence, about 2 miles northward of Heytesbury; near it is Old Ditch, which, commencing at Westbury Leigh, stretches, with few interruptions, across Salisbury Plain to Durnford, on the river Avon. The site of two villages, which were connected by means of Old Ditch, is pointed out on Knook Down; the spot is marked by great cavities and irregularities of ground.

Lord Heytesbury is lord of the manor and the sole landowner.

The soil is various, some is light, other clay; subsoil, chalk and stone. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley.

The area is 1,440 acres; gross estimated rental, £1,811; rateable value, £1, 602; and the population in 1871 was 176.

ANSTROW HILL, 2 miles north-east, was a Roman establishment.
