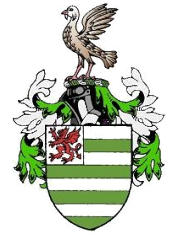

Landford

LANDFORD is a parish bordering on Hampshire, on a branch of the river Test, and on the road from Salisbury to Southampton, 5½ miles from Downton station on the Alderbury and Wimborne section, and 6 miles south from Dean station on the Eastleigh and Salisbury branch of the London & South Western railway, 10 south-east from Salisbury and 7 west from Romsey, in the Salisbury division of the county, Frustfield hundred, Salisbury union and county court district, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division, rural deanery of Amesbury (Alderbury portion), and archdeaconry and diocese of Salisbury. The church of St Andrew, rebuilt in 1858, at a cost of £1500, is an edifice of brick and stone, in the Early English style, and consists of chancel, nave, south transept, north porch and a western bell turret, containing a peal of 6 tubular bells: on the west wall is a brass plate framed in oak bearing the names of those men of the parish who lost their lives in the Great War, 1914-18: there are 180 sittings. The register dates from the year 1671. The living is a rectory, net yearly value, £284, with residence and 5½ acres of glebe, in the gift of Oxford University and held since 1917 by the Rev. Herbert Montague Davies MA of St. Edmund Hall, Oxford, who is also rector of Plaitford. Landford Manor, the property of Douglas Eyre esq, is the residence of Sir Frederick G. P. Preston K.B.E. Douglas Eyre esq, who is lord of the manor is the principal landowner. The soil is chiefly gravel, sub-soil, sand and gravel. The chief crops are wheat, barley and turnips. The area of Landford and Earldoms is 2,756 acres; rateable value of Landford £3,695; the population of the ecclesiastical parish in 1911 was 336 and 407 in the civil parish, including Earldoms.

Sexton: Edward King

EARLDOMS, 1½ miles north-west, formerly a civil parish, is now a hamlet in this parish. The place, with a population of 22 in 1911, is reputed to be extra-parochial for ecclesiastical purposes.
