#### SALVAGE STEWARDS

THE Urban District Council of Melksham have received a communication from the Ministry of Supply strongly recommending a Scheme for the enlistment of Salvage Stewards in connection with their salvage operations, and they accordingly invite applications from suitable persons who are prepared to act in this capacity.

Each Salvage Steward appointed will receive a card certifying his appointment, and will receive a copy of a pamphlet prepared for the general guidance of Salvage Stewards.

It is the intention of the Council to appoint Salvage Stewards for each street, or a group of streets, and persons willing to co-operate are asked to communicate in writing to the Clerk of the Council, Clerk's Office, Town Hall, Melksham, not later than Saturday, the 14<sup>th</sup> instant. 3<sup>rd</sup> March, 1942.
