Important to Solicitors and Suitors

At the last Gloucester County Court, at the Shire-Hall, a cause was tried, in which the defendant was a person living within one of the seven Hundreds of Cirencester. It was stated, on behalf of the defendant, that the six Hundreds of Bradley, Brightwell's Barrow, Rapsgate, Longtree, Bisley, and Crowthorne and Minety, were in the reign of Richard annexed to the Hundreds of Cirencester, and called the seven Hundreds of Cirencester. That down to the year 1790, the small debts were recovered within those Hundreds in the Court Baron, the proceedings wherein were similar to those in the County Court.

That in 1790 an act was passed, establishing a Court of Requests at Cirencester, for the speedy and cheap recovery of all debts under 40s from persons residing within the said seven Hundreds; in which it is enacted that no debt, not amounting to 40s shall be recoverable from any person so residing within the said seven Hundreds, in any Court at Westminster, or other Court, or elsewhere out of the said Court of Requests, and that such act shall be received in evidence without pleading the same. The act was produced and the plaintiff was non-suited.

It was also stated, that an attorney had been suspended from practice for suing in an improper course, and putting the parties to several pounds expense, when the defendant was suable in a Court of Requests at the cost of a few shillings; and the plaintiff in such case is liable to an action.
