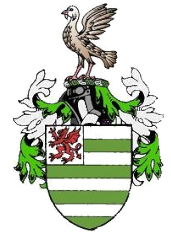

No Man's Land

NO MAN'S LAND, formerly extra-parochial, is now a parish on the borders of Hampshire, 12 miles south-east from Salisbury, and 7 from Downton station on the Salisbury and Wimborne line of the London & South Western railway, in the Southern division of the county, Salisbury union, Salisbury and Amesbury petty sessional division. The schoolroom has been licensed for divine worship by the Bishop of Salisbury, and services are conducted here by the Rev. Adoph Conrad Muller BA, vicar of Redlynch. There is a Primitive Methodist chapel. A village hall with reading room and library was erected in 1910. The place is composed of several small freeholds. The area is 614 acres; rateable value £174: the population in 1911 was 127.

This parish is reputed to be extra-parochial for ecclesiastical purposes.

Post Office: Mrs Sarah Halls, sub-postmistress. Letters received from Lyndhurst, Hants at 8.30am & 3.30pm; dispatched at 9.40am & 5.40pm weekdays only. Landford, 1.5 miles distant, is the nearest money order and telegraph office.

Carriers: to Southampton, John King, Mon, Wed & Fri; and Joshua Grayer, Thurs; Salisbury, Joshua Grayer Tues & Sat.

A motor omnibus runs between No Man's Land and Southampton Thurs., leaving at 9.30am and returning from Southampton at 3.30pm the same day.

Elementary School, built in 1865 and enlarged in 1894, with residence for master: Wyndham S Boundy, master.
