

Arthur Civill Leading Supply Assistant P/MX 65853, Royal Navy

Arthur Civill was born on the 1st April 1919, his birth being registered in the June Quarter of 1919 in the Pontypridd Registration District.

He was the son of James and Sarah Ann Civill (nee Drew) of Yarnbrook, North Bradley.

He was killed in action aged 24 on 11th October 1943 aboard H.M.S Hythe which was a fleet minesweeper. The ship was torpedoes by a German submarine and sunk off Bougie, Algeria.

YARNBROOK TORPEDOED OFF ITALY Arthur Civill Reported Killed



Arthur Civill, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Civill of Glengyle, Yarnbrook, Trowbridge, is reported killed in action, when the minesweeper in which he was serving was torpedoed off Italy. Aged 24, he attended the Trowbridge Boys' High School and was afterwards employed in the office of Messrs. Bowyers of Trowbridge, until he joined the Royal Navy three and a half years ago. He was a Leading Supply Assistant.
