A Glebe Terrier, specific to the Church of England, is a detailed list describing the church's property in the parish and typically comprises the vicarage or rectory, fields, the church, its contents and graveyard. Glebe terriers often contain the names of tenants and the holders of adjoining land.

3 Jan 1705 49 (D1/24/15/3)

A dwelling house, orchard and garden of c. 1/4a., the churchyard adjoining. For cow white every 14th day's milk skimmed and made into cheese in a housewife manner, beginning the 3 May if a Monday, if not the Monday after, till the Monday after 6 Nov. All other great and small tithes.
