Personality of the month.

The approach of Christmas is probably the ideal time to personify Ron Westacott, the reason being that he has almost certainly played the role of Father Christmas more often than anybody else within the Benefice.

Originally when he came to Seend, Ron only intended to stay for three years. Instead, he's still here after over thirty-one years. He retired following forty years service with the Admiralty/MOD(Navy) working in Royal Dockyards and naval bases at home and abroad, service for which he was awarded the Queen's Jubilee Medal.

Looking at Ron's contributions to so many areas of sport and society in Seend, they come as no surprise when his life prior to Seend is examined. He had spent some thirty five years in amateur theatricals with eleven companies both at home and overseas before retiring from the Bath Drama Club. However, he has kept his hand in with twenty pantomime appearances with the Seend Fawlty Players. When stationed in Hong Kong in the 1950's he wrote, directed and performed in radio drama. He confesses to enjoying a moment of glory when the South China Morning Post referred to him as "Hong Kong's Own Playwright". At home he had two radio scripts broadcast by the BBC. (Watch for him in The Fawlty Players forthcoming production of Hansel and Gretel).

As we know, his enthusiasm for almost any sport is boundless. At age 18 he made some appearances for Bath City F.C. Reserves and continued playing competitive football until aged 54 and cricket for a considerable time thereafter. He boxed for the naval base in Ceylon and as an independent, was welter weight runner up in the 1946 Ceylon ABA championships. (The winner represented Ceylon in the 1948 London Olympics). In 1972 he qualified as a football referee with Somerset F.A. and since coming to the Parish he has served as trainer, Chairman and President of Seend United F.C. The cricket club has been equally lucky in getting Ron's services as Captain, Secretary/Treasurer and President. He officiates as Umpire in the traditional August Bank Holiday fun game, and prepares the pitch for Families Day and for the Fete.

He has given 26 years coaching and assisting with sport at Seend School helping to turn out many winning teams and for 13 years helped with Riding for the Disabled at Heddington and Lackham. He ran a ladies Keep Fit class and organised the sports activities for Seend Church Families Day. Ron's support for the Seend Lye Recreation Field also extends over many years having twice been Vice-Chairman and once acting Chairman. He was a prime mover in the creation of the Millennium Garden

and for a long time, has been a staunch member of the Last of the Summer Wine. Always at the forefront at Fete time, in addition to helping with preparation he has participated in many roles and claims to be the only man to traverse the High Street by child's bicycle, roller skates, 8 feet stilts and on the back of a camel.

Space precludes so much that should be said. He has undertaken sponsored walks and raised money for various charities. He has given in depth talks on the American Civil War. He is a Vice-President of the Social Club, a member of the Seend Theatre Group, the Seend Poetry Group, the Rambling Club and still manages to paint, carve and sculpt in his spare time. And there is still much left unsaid. Ron's contribution to our society has been, and continues to be, enormous.He well and truly deserved being awarded an MBE in 1996 for his services to our community.

Armistice Day:

A group of 28 members and non members, including some visitors to the Parish, gathered at the War Memorial at 11.00hrs. on Friday, 11th November, for a short time of silence and prayers in remembrance of those who died in the two world wars and subsequent hostilities. The prayers were led by The Reverend Julian Harford and the two minutes silence was observed.

Remembrance Sunday:

Thirty five members of the Legion paraded for the annual Remembrance Day service under the command of Colonel Nigel Knocker and, after wreaths had been laid at the War Memorial by Major Anthonly Hodgkinson (RBL), Peter Fisher (RAF), Liz Campbell (MU) and Shirley West (WI), they were led into church by our Standard Bearer, Brian Culverhouse. The service commenced with the reading of the names of those from the village who had died during the two world wars, read by our President Peter Hicks. This was followed by the two minutes silence, with the Last Post and Reveille being played by our Bugler, Derek Kimber, who has now been carrying out these duties for us for 38 years. The service was conducted by the Rector, The Reverend Sacha Pearce assisted by our Chaplain, The Reverend Freddie White.

After the service all members of the congregation were invited to the Community Centre for light refreshments, and our thanks go to the Centre Staff for laying this on so well and to those attending for their kind contributions towards the cost.

Poppy Collection:

The usual team of Poppy Sellers toured the Village during the fortnight preceding Remembrance Day and, thanks to the generosity of all those who subscribed, broke last years record collection with a total of £2,415.
