



Sudden Death of Mrs Parry Nisbet

The sudden death of Mrs Nisbet, wife of our excellent and worthy neighbour (R. Parry Nisbet, Esq., of Southbroom House), has cast a gloom over the town and neighbourhood. Few ladies were more generally beloved and respected – certainly none whose heart and purse were more readily opened to acts of kindness and charity, that the lady whose loss all have so much reason to deplore. Mr and Mrs Nisbet had walked into town on Monday morning between 11 and 12 o'clock, with the intention of returning home together, but while Mr Nisbet was passing through the street a message was communicated to him that his attendance was required at the magistrates' office. He accordingly went thither, and was detained perhaps half an hour, during which Mrs Nisbet called at one or two shops, and then proceeded to Southbroom. She had however only just passed through the gates when she fell in the carriage drive leading to the house, and expired almost immediately. She had, we understand, been under medical treatment for some time previously, but although in delicate health, there was every reason to hope that she might have been spared many years to make Southbroom what it has been ever since he residence in it – a centre of kindness and hospitality to all who have the privilege of being admitted within its portals.
