Parish Council Matters...

A meeting was held recently between Bradford on Avon Area Board representative Peter Dunford, Unitary Councillor Trevor Carbin, Cllr Ray Symonds and June Jones to discuss many of the outstanding issues in and around Staverton and, with the Board's help, we are slowly starting to see an improvement in services from Wiltshire Council. The Board will be meeting on **21 November at 7pm** in the meeting room at Cereal Partners, all welcome.

Litter near Retail Area at The Slipway: Newly elected Councillor Ray Symonds has taken up the challenge to clear unwanted litter from this area and the bridge. He has been successfully organising sponsorship for a litter bin at the retail area. We hope to see this installed very soon.

Pavilion/Changing Room at Sports Ground: Councillor Jon Perry, who joined the parish council in May, has set up a working party to change this facility from showers and changing rooms into a community building suitable for everyone to use. Overhead costs escalated, making this building too costly to be used just as a sports facility and unsuitable, in its present state, to be used by clubs and organisations, for many health and safety reasons. Several enthusiastic members of the community have shown an interest in this project and Cllr Perry would like to hear from anyone else willing to get involved.

Service redirection through Cottles Barton and Marina Drive: The bus 68 service is due to start on 27 August. Buses will run hourly between 08.45 am and 17.45 pm (not Sundays).

The 64 shoppers' bus, and the Zigzag, are also going through, but not the X88 Wednesday shoppers' bus, which is too big for the road.

Thestfield Roundabout near canal bridge: This roundabout has become an eyesore and too costly for Wiltshire Council to maintain. The roundabout was originally designed by Persimmon Homes and its poor condition has been the subject of years of complaints to Wiltshire Council from the parish council and residents. By attracting sponsorship the parish council is hoping to get the roundabout redesigned and regularly maintained.

Thestfield Bridge verges: You will have noticed the broken fencing and poorly maintained verges. Again this has been an ongoing battle with Wiltshire Council to keep this maintained. The good news is that the fencing is now repaired and we are fighting to get the grass and shrubs maintained more often.

Car Park at Cottles Barton: This small car park has been designated for visitors to Staverton Sports Ground but has not yet been adopted by Wiltshire Council from Persimmon Homes. It will also be used as an overflow car park for the primary school to alleviate the traffic congestion at School Lane. A sign will be erected in due course. It is hoped this will also alleviate parking congestion on Marina Drive at weekends.

Footpath bordering the sports ground between Marina Drive and School Lane: The parish council has long been concerned that this footpath, which is regularly used by parents and children attending Staverton Primary School, should have adequate lighting for winter days. Unfortunately, the parish council have not been able to attract funding for this. However, the school submitted a Travel Plan to Wiltshire Council highlighting many problems facing schoolchildren. Wiltshire Council has notified the Parish Council that a survey will be carried out later this year to try and resolve these issues and a report will be submitted with recommendations. This survey is welcomed.

Redirection of HGV's away from Bath and on to Staverton roads: Due to the recent ban on HGVs through Bath, it has caused lorries to travel through Bradford on Avon and Staverton where the infrastructure cannot cope with the additional traffic. The Secretary of State has been asked to mediate on this and we are now awaiting a statement. Unfortunately the recent bid by Staverton Parish Council to establish a weight limit on the river bridge at Cereal Partners has been rejected.

Resignation of Staverton Councillors: It was very sad that Cllr Justin Hughes and Cllr Simon Richardson, both resigned earlier in the year as they had been very active participants on the parish council, Justin successfully getting permission from the land owner Michael Blake to extend access to a permissive footpath behind the riding stables and Simon reworking the parish council website (which I am pleased to say he is still involved with) and helping with many of the sports ground issues.

At the last parish council meeting in July, Cllr Trevor Heeks and Cllr Karen Richardson resigned also. Trevor is very well known locally as being a local celebrity and the Trowbridge Town Crier and devotes most of his spare time attending charity events raising funds for excellent causes. He has been a very useful source of historical knowledge around the village and actively helped with the recent renovation of the large play area in School Lane.

Karen has just become a mother for the first time and has just realised that motherhood can be very demanding as well as rewarding. Our congratulations and best wishes go to her and her family. The parish council thanks all these councillors for their dedication and hard work whilst serving as councillors. Thankfully, they have all expressed a wish to keep involved in village matters.

However, we are also pleased to welcome newcomers Cllr Jon Perry and Cllr Ray Symonds who have already hit the ground running. Jon has successfully started a working group to improve facilities at the pavilion and Ray has declared war on litter and has already been involved in the litter picks in Staverton and getting local businesses to help with this problem. Well done to both of them!

ROAD MARKINGS and WAITING RESTRICTIONS STAVERTON

To support an application to Wiltshire Council for a survey to be carried out, the Parish Council invites residents to report any road traffic accidents or near misses at areas around the village so that these incidents can be forward on as evidence of the need for road markings. This is very important as Wiltshire Council will not install these measures without evidence from residents. This is your chance to improve road safety near you!

Have you been involved in a road traffic accident or near miss? Have you witnessed any accidents over the last few years? If so when and where? Do you have major problems with inappropriate parking?

Joe Hudd has, for the past year, been researching and writing a book on the Hudd family who lived on Marsh Road, Hilperton.

James and Elizabeth Hudd ran a successful florists and grocers from the property called The Nurseries and sold their produce from a shop in Silver Street, Trowbridge.

The family occupied the home from the 1800's until around 1990 when the last member of the Hudd family sold up. The family descendants married into many of the local families around the area and continued to live, work and die there.

There were many great achievements for the family. Emily Hudd married James Hooper and became the first permanent school teacher for Staverton, when the school was located in an old warehouse next to the Kennet and Avon canal. The family also had their own fair share of tragedies, as any family would. Alec James Hudd died in the First World War and was commemorated on the lectern in St Paul's Church.

Joe feels it is very important to record as much information as possible about our families for future generations. This is why he is asking for help.

Laced with insects and little thriving plants, Something so magial about being so exposed to this scene before me,


Life, being lived, embraced by many, on the Marina.

Wiltshire Council...

Recycling

Wiltshire Council is to cut back the hours of the Household Recycling Centres and cut the number of recycling 'bring sites' around the county. This follows the introduction of kerbside collections of most recyclable materials. All HRCs will close every evening at 5pm, instead of opening later on some evenings in summer.

Collection of plastic bottles and cardboard from bring sites including Staverton Club will stop in October. The site will then switch back to cans, bottles, paper and textiles collections.

Bridge bashing

The parapet of the canal bridge has taken a knock. This bridge is owned and maintained by the Canals and Rivers Trust (formerly

British Waterways) and they say they have inspected the damage and believe it to be safe in the short term. They are looking at repairing the bridge but haven't said when that will be done. Meanwhile the threat of more lorries through the village due to a proposed HGV restriction on Cleveland Bridge in Bath has receded, at least temporarily. An appeal against the closure, submitted by Wiltshire and Somerset councils together with the Highways Agency, is being considered by the government, and the latest estimate is that it will take them six months to reach a decision.

Next Area Board meeting is on Wednesday 21st November Staverton at Cereal Partners. 6.30 for 7pm start.


