



# Crime and Punishment

## *Sutton Mandeville*

### Committed to Fisherton Gaol

This particular gaol was built between 1818 & 1822 on the east side of the Devizes Road, Salisbury just beyond the junction with Wilton Road and was closed in 1870. The building was demolished from 1875 except for the central block and acquired by Dr William Corbin Finch, the proprietor of the Fisherton House Lunatic Asylum and named Radnor House.

Snook	Moses	Charged with having broken open the dwelling house of Samuel Goodfellow, and stealing therefrom one gun, his property, at Sutton Mandeville.  <i>Outcome:</i> 2 months hard labour, to be whipped twice	<i>Salisbury and Winchester Journal</i> 6 Oct., 1828 & <i>Salisbury and Winchester Journal</i> 25 Jan., 1830
Brown	Joseph	Alias, Joseph Sharpe, charged with stealing a linen cloth, the property of John Bracher, at Sutton Mandeville. (Aged 30) <i>Outcome:</i> Convicted & sentenced to 3 month's imprisonment  (Also tried for stealing a great-coat, and other articles, the property of Thomas Bunter – Acquitted)	<i>Salisbury and Winchester Journal</i> 28 Oct., 1833 & <i>Salisbury and Winchester Journal</i> 17 March, 1834

Johnson	Jesse	Of Sutton Mandeville, charged with receiving a quantity of wool, knowing the same to have been feloniously stolen.	<i>Salisbury and Winchester Journal</i> 2 Sept., 1839
Soomer	James	Of Sutton Mandeville, for leaving his wife & family chargeable to the parish. <i>Outcome:</i> 1 month imprisonment	<i>Salisbury and Winchester Journal</i> 17 May., 1845
Whatley	John	Of Sutton Mandeville, for stealing three pair of trowsers and a variety of other articles, together with three half-crown pieces, the property of Alfred Johnson.	<i>Devizes and Wiltshire Gazette</i> 14 Jan., 1847
Andrews	Arthur	Of Sutton Mandeville, for leaving service.  <i>Outcome:</i> 1 month imprisonment	<i>Salisbury and Winchester Journal</i> 24 April, 1847
Snook	Phoebe	Of Sutton Mandeville, for stealing a pair of stockings, the property of James Toomer.  <i>Outcome:</i> 1 month imprisonment with hard labour	<i>Salisbury and Winchester Journal</i> 22 May, 1847 & <i>Salisbury and Winchester Journal</i> 3 July, 1847
