Frank Leslie SOWTON

Frank Leslie Sowton was born in early 1894 at Norwood, South Australia to parents William & Mary Ann Sowton (nee Dunn). He was a 21 year old, single, Printer from 123 Sydenham Road, Norwood, South Australia when he enlisted at Adelaide, South Australia on 19th January, 1916 with the 27th Infantry Battalion, 11th Reinforcements of the Australian Army (A.I.F.). His service number was 4521 & his religion was Church of England. His next of kin was listed as his mother – Mrs Mary Sowton of 123 Sydenham Road, Norwood, South Australia (Father deceased). Frank Sowton had served with 1 year with Senior Cadets & then transferred to Civilian Force in which he had served for 4 years & was still serving.

Private Frank Leslie Sowton embarked from Adelaide on HMAT *Shropshire (A9)* on 25th March, 1916 & disembarked in Egypt (date not recorded).

Private Sowton embarked from Alexandria on H.M.T. *Tunisian* on 29th May, 1916 & disembarked at Marseilles, France on 5th June, 1916. Private Sowton was attached to 2nd Divisional Base Depot at Etaples, France on 8th June, 1916.

Private Sowton proceeded to join his Unit on 7th August, 1916 & was taken on strength with 27th Battalion from 11th Reinforcements on 11th August, 1916.

Private Sowton was sent to Hospital in the field in France on 20th November, 1916 with Trench feet. He was taken to 5th Australian Field Ambulance then transferred to 38th Casualty Clearing Station. Private Sowton was then admitted to No. 5 General Hospital at Rouen on 22nd November, 1916. He embarked on Hospital Ship *Goorkha* at Havre for England on 24th November, 1916. Private Sowton was admitted to 3rd Southern General Hospital with Trench feet (slight) on 25th November, 1916.

Private Sowton was on furlo from 10th to 25th January, 1917.

Private Sowton was marched in from furlo to No. 1 Command Depot at Perham Down on 26th January, 1917. He was medically classified as B1 A.

Private Sowton was marched in to No. 4 Command Depot at Wareham from Perham Downs on 30th January, 1917.

Private Sowton was admitted to 1st Australian Dermatological Hospital at Bulford with VD from 7th February to 17th February, 1917. He was transferred to Parkhouse Hospital on 17th February, 1917 & discharged on 9th April, 1917.

Private Sowton was marched in from Parkhouse Hospital to No. 1 Command Depot at Perham Down on 10th April, 1917. He was medically classified as B1 A.

Private Sowton was marched out to 16th Brigade at Wareham on 23rd April, 1917 & transferred to 70th Battalion at Wareham from No. 1 Command Depot on 24th April, 1917.

Private Sowton was written up on 21st May, 1917 at Windmill Hill “for being absent from Inlying piquet after being duly warned on 20th May, 1917 (Throwing duty on another).” He was awarded 5 days Confined to Camp & forfeited 1 days’ pay.

Private Sowton was written up on 23rd May, 1917 at Windmill Hill for “(1) being absent from Defaulters Parade 7.30 pm, 8 pm, 8.30 pm & 9 pm. (2) Absent from Defaulters Parade after being duly warned 6pm - 24th May, 1917 until apprehended 9.15 pm on 24th May, 1917.” He was awarded 7 days FP No. 2 (Field Punishment).

Private Sowton was written up for an offence on 4th June, 1917 – “Unshaven on 9am parade”. He was awarded 2 days Confined to Camp.

Private Sowton was transferred to 27th Battalion from 69th Draft Battalion on 19th September, 1917.

Private Sowton proceeded overseas to France from Hurdcott (69th Draft Battalion) via Southampton on 14th October, 1917.

Private Sowton was admitted to 2nd Australian Divisional Base Depot at Havre on 15th October, 1917. He proceeded to join his Unit on 18th October, 1917 & was taken on strength with his Unit in Belgium on 20th October, 1917.

Private Sowton was wounded in action in France on 10th June, 1918. He was taken to 5th Australian Field Ambulance with a gunshot wound to right wrist. He was then transferred to 20th Casualty Clearing Station on 11th June, 1918 & transferred to 54th General Hospital on 12th June, 1918. Private Sowton was transferred to 1st Convalescent Depot on 16th June, 1918 & then transferred again on 20th June, 1918 to Australian Convalescent Depot.

Private Sowton was discharged to Base Depot on 4th July, 1918 at Havre. He proceeded to join his Unit on 9th July, 1918 & rejoined his Battalion in France on 10th July, 1918.

Private Sowton was appointed Lance Corporal on 1st September, 1918.

Lance Corporal Sowton was on leave to England from 26th September, 1918 & rejoined from leave on 13th October, 1918.

Lance Corporal Sowton was appointed Corporal on 4th October, 1918 – vice 2449 Cpl. McDonald killed on 3rd October, 1918.

Corporal Sowton was marched out from his Unit on 12th March, 1919 & embarked for England on 25th March, 1919. Corporal Sowton disembarked at Weymouth, England on 26th March, 1919 & was marched in to No. 1 Command Depot.

Corporal Frank Leslie Sowton was sent sick then admitted to the 1st Australian General Hospital at Sutton Veny, Wiltshire on 1st April, 1919 dangerously ill.

Corporal Frank Leslie Sowton died at 10.30 am on 18th April, 1919 at the 1st Australian General Hospital, Sutton Veny of Nephritis.

A death for Frank L. Sowton, aged 26, was registered in the June quarter, 1919 in the district of Warminster, Wiltshire.

Corporal Frank Leslie Sowton was buried on 22nd April, 1919 in St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny - Grave no. 83. From the burial report of Cpl. Sowton - *Coffin was Elm with Brass Mounts – Deceased was buried with full Military Honours, the coffin draped with the Australian flag being borne to the graveside on a Gun Carriage preceded by a Firing Party from 1st Australian Training Brigade. Six of Deceased's late Unit comrades supported the Pall. The "Last Post" was sounded and volleys fired over the grave. A number of Australians followed the remains and were present at the graveside ceremony. Headquarters A.I.F. Depots in United Kingdom were represented at the funeral.*

Frank Leslie Sowton requested in his Will, dated 13th September, 1917, that he bequeathed all his personal estate absolutely to his mother – Mrs Annie Sowton of Norwood, Sth Australia.

Corporal Frank Leslie Sowton was entitled to British War Medal & the Victory Medal. A Memorial Scroll & Memorial Plaque were also sent to Cpl. Sowton's mother – Mrs M. A. Sowton (Scroll sent March, 1922 & Plaque sent November, 1922).

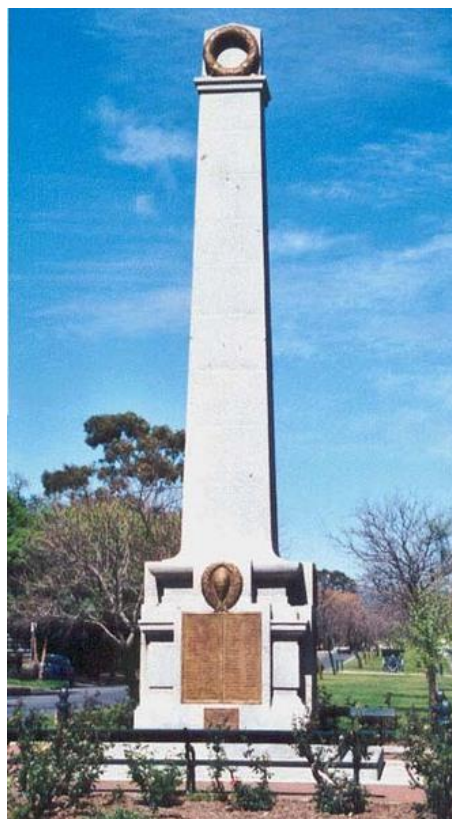
The CWGC lists Corporal Frank Leslie Sowton, 4521, of 27th Battalion, Australian Infantry, A.I.F., as the son of Mary Sowton, of 17 May Terrace, Kensington Park, South Australia; and the late William Sowton. Born at Norwood, South Australia.

Corporal F. L. Sowton is commemorated in the Hall of Memory Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, Australia on Panel 111.

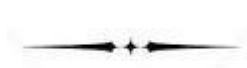

Commonwealth War Graves Commission Headstones

The Defence Department, in 1920/21, contacted the next of kin of the deceased World War 1 soldiers to see if they wanted to include a personal inscription on the permanent headstone at St. John the Evangelist Churchyard at Sutton Veny. Space was reserved for 66 letters only (with the space between any two words to be counted as an additional letter) & the rate per letter was around 3 ½ d (subject to fluctuation).

The expense in connection for the erection of permanent headstones over the graves of fallen soldiers was borne by the Australian Government. (*Information obtained from letters sent to next of kin in 1921*)

Corporal Frank Leslie Sowton does have a personal inscription on his headstone.
