A second case occurred at Bradford, some days since, when a letter was received from America by the assigns of the late Mr G. Mundy, ironmonger, of that town, containing a gold dollar, the sender admitting he some years ago stole that amount from Mr M.

And on Friday last, a letter was received from Bradford, addressed "Mr William Porter at Stancombe Factery foreman, Trowbridge Wilts."

Exactly thus written

"Dear Sir, Wen I wose a Boy I Tuck a Half Sovin from your Poucket wish I now send you with inteeret 80 Penny Postage, Stamp enclosed Yours Tuerly a Sinr."
