INTRODUCTION

Mr Sergeant Wilde opened the Commission for the Special Assizes for the County of Wiltshire at 3 o'clock on the 27th December 1830. He had come from Winchester, where the Special Assize for Hampshire was still in progress, for that purpose. After the usual formalities had been gone through the Court was adjourned until 10 o'clock on Friday, 31st December. Mr Baron Vaughan, Mr Justice J Parke, and Mr Justice Alderson, the three judges who were to preside over the Special Commission, arrived in Salisbury shortly after mid-day on the 31st December. After a service, held at the Cathedral, the Court was adjourned again until the following morning. At a little before 10 o'clock on Saturday the 1st January 1831 the three Judges entered the Court. After the usual formalities had been gone through the Grand Jury was sworn in, a proclamation against vice and immorality was read and Mr Justice Parke delivered the charge to the Grand Jury after which they retired and several bills were sent up to them. After an absence of about three quarters of an hour they returned a true bill against 23 men, for destroying a thrashing machine belonging to John Benett Esquire, at Pythouse Farm in the parish of Tisbury, on the 25th of November last. The trials had begun.

The prison calendar contained more than 300 names, and included three women. The trials lasted eight days and at the end of this time 104 men had been sentenced to transportation, 47 men had a sentence of death recorded against them, of these 44 had their sentences commuted to transportation and two men, Peter Withers and James Lush, had been left for execution. Both men were eventually reprieved and their sentences were commuted to transportation for life.

The men sentenced to transportation were taken from Fisherton Gaol to the prison hulk *York* at Portsmouth, where they met up with a number of other men from counties in Southern England who had also been found guilty of machine breaking and were awaiting transportation. Three ships carried the majority of the men to Australia, the *Eliza* and *Proteus* taking the men to

Tasmania, or Van Diemen's Land, as it was then called, and the *Eleanor* sailing for New South Wales.

Other prisoners appeared at the Assizes and Quarter Sessions for Wiltshire in 1831 and 1832, charged with arson, sending threatening letters, machine breaking and rioting. Of these one man, Henry Wilkins, was found guilty of arson and executed on 22nd March 1831, three men, Job Hatherell, John Alexander, and Jacob Wiltshire, were found guilty of sending threatening letters. The first two were sentenced to transportation for life, and the latter to transportation for 14 years.

By 1840 the majority of the transported men had been pardoned, some receiving a free pardon, others a conditional pardon. Those with a free pardon could now return home if the wished to. So far I have found 12 men who, it would seem, returned to Wiltshire after they were pardoned. Several others applied, and were given permission, to have their wives and families join them in Australia, but it would appear that not all of these wives took up the offer to join their husbands.

This volume is an attempt to piece together the lives of all those who were tried for rioting, machine breaking, and arson, and to find out what became of them, and their families, when the riots were over.

FURTHER DETAILS: Lord Arundell spoke for Thomas Abery at an examination before the local magistrates held at Salisbury on the 1st December 1830. (*The Times*, 3 December 1830)

'Many of the prisoners received excellent characters from their masters and others. One of them, (a mason, named Abery), upon being asked if any person could speak in his favour, appealed to Lord Arundell. His Lordship said he knew the man, who had worked for him for the last year; that he was a very industrious fellow, and he was sorry to see him there. He added, that he was the very person, who, when Salisbury cathedral was repaired, was hauled up to the top in a basket.'

Ann Williams, 2^{nd} wife of Thomas Abery

It is very likely that the Ann Williams who was tried at the Middlesex Gaol Delivery, 3 July 1834, found guilty of stealing from the person, and sentenced to transportation for 14 years, was the Ann Williams who married Thomas Abery. She arrived in VDL on board the *New Grove* on 27 March 1835. Details of the trial can be found in the Proceedings of the Old Bailey, only a brief outline is given here. Original Text:

1019. EDWARD PAGE and ANN WILLIAMS were indicted for stealing, on the 14th of June, 41 tooth-pick cases, value 47l.; 1 tin box, value 6d.; 1 mahogany box, value 1s.; 1 bag, value 2s.; and 12 sovereigns, the goods and monies of William Hitchin, from the person of Richard Hitchin.

RICHARD HITCHIN. I am in the employ of my father, William Hitchin; he lives in Bridgewater-gardens, and is an ivory and mother-of-peal worker. On the 14^{th} of June I had the articles stated, in two boxes – twenty-eight tooth-pick cases were in a tin box, and the rest in a mahogany box – they were in a bag – the sovereigns were in my pocket – I had been with my

father to various houses we deal with, and had been drinking at two or three houses; the last house was in Bond-street – and when I came out it took effect on me – I did not know where I was till I found myself in a court in Bainbridge-street, St Giles's, between seven and eight o'clock – my bag was gone, and all my money, except two shillings, and two sixpences – I went to the station-house, and gave notice – I know nothing of the prisoners.

WILLIAM PHILLIPS. I am a sergeant in the Fusilier Guards. The prisoner Page was a drummer in our regiment – I don't know whether he was absent on the 14th of June, but he was on the Monday following, and I received orders to stop him – he came in on the next morning, about six o'clock – the sentry stopped him by my orders, and called me – I took him to the guard-room, to wait till the pay-sergeant came – he said he wanted to go to the privy – I went with him, and thought he put something down – I placed a man there, and got a light – I found on a lodgement this part of a duplicate, and lower down I found the other part – it was for a box pawned on the 16th, for 3s., with Page's name on it – he had been nine years in the regiment, and had a good character.

JOHN THOMAS CRESSWELL. I am a pawnbroker, and live in St. Martin's-lane. This tooth-pick case was pawned with me on the 16th by Page.

JOHN HOUGHTON. I belong to the Fusilier Guards. On Sunday, the 15th of June, Page gave me this tooth-pick case, which he said had been given to him, and it had come from France.

The following pawnbrokers all identified Ann Williams as the person who had pawned a tooth-pick case to them on the 14th and 16th of June:- William John Bird, Benjamin Titford, Edward Julius Sutton, George Adnams, Benjamin Birdseye Reeve, Thomas Capp (no date given), William Botwood, Joseph Thimbleby and James Sayer.

EDMUND MUNDAY. (police-serjeant E 2) I heard of this robbery – I went to the different pawnbrokers – there were eleven more cases found; but they could not identify the prisoners, and they were given up – the money is quite lost.

(Williams put in a written defence, stating that she had found a parcel in the court containing the property, and not finding an owner, had pledged the articles. PAGE - GUILTY. Aged 22.




FURTHER INFORMATION ON THE ALEXANDER BROTHERS IN TASMANIA.

After receiving an Absolute Pardon in February 1836 Matthias and Joseph stayed in the Longford area of Tasmania, where Matthias married, working at an estate called Wickford. In 1849, Matthias bought 500 acres at Redlands in the Deloraine area and his brother, John, bought 5 acres before he departed to the goldfields in This must have been a successful venture because when he returned in the latter part of 1851 he started to buy land on Table Cape near the present day Wynyard. By mid 1852, he owned about 2,500 acres. In 1851, Matthias visited the Victorian goldfields at Ballarat. On the return journey he took passage on board the City of Melbourne and was wrecked off King Island. Matthias survived the shipwreck and returned to Launceston on board the rescue vessel. Then, he joined his brother at Table Cape. John and Matthias were among the first settlers at Table Cape and called their settlement 'Alexandria'. This was before the present town of Wynyard was settled. The brothers prospered at their Table Cape settlement. Matthias built an inn and called it the Table Cape Inn. On 15 September 1853 bushrangers Bradlev and Conner arrived in the area and commandeered a ship on the Inglis River and shots were fired at the people who were trying to stop them, especially Matthias, who was wearing a read cap at the time. The bushrangers got away with the ship and escaped to Melbourne, where after a further period of crime they were eventually captured and hanged.

A Road Trust was formed in the late 1850's, a forerunner of the Wynyard Council, and started charging rates. When Matthias thought the rates were a bit high, he felled some big trees across the road to hinder the inspectors. At that time the road/track to Stanley went up over Table Cape area and followed the seashore to Stanley. John was now an important landowner on Table Cape and was instrumental in the clearing of the heavy timber from the area, assisted by Matthias and his family. Some of the trees were so large that a scarf had to be cut into the trunk so that an eight-foot crosscut saw could be used. The timber that was not split and sent to mainland Australia, or used locally, was

burnt or rolled over the cliffs that surrounded the area. All this was done using bullock or horse teams. The brothers also had a general store and a blacksmith's shop, and built the first boat in the area in approximately 1852/3. They called the boat *Alexander*, and used it for trading in timber, potatoes etc, to Melbourne and Sydney. Matthias died on 31 October 1865 and was buried in the private Alexander Cemetery on Table Cape.

Matthias' grandson, Frederick Matthias Alexander, was born in Alexandria on 20 January 1869 where his father was a blacksmith. He bequeathed to the world the Alexander Technique that is now taught around the globe to many thousands of people. The technique has been the subject of dozens of books and numerous articles in medical journals. Frederick Matthias Alexander is listed as one of the 200 men who made Australia great and a plaque has been erected on Table Cape to commemorate him and in 2002 Wynyard received a grant to erect a statue of him.

In 1859, John leased a small section of the foreshore at Burnie from the Van Diemen's Land Company. In 1860, he built a framework for a 'pig-sty' wharf but a storm swept this away. By now he had moved to Burnie and applied to build a jetty and obtained agreement from the Van Diemen's Land Company who owned the land abutting the shore. He built a timber jetty which proved most useful but the only way John could obtain reimbursement for his efforts was to charge wharfage tolls. However, no alternative was built until 1872, when the wooden jetty had almost rotted away. John diverted his energies to ship owning commissioned the building of the Martha and Jane. His son in law, John Jones, was the captain and in 1870, he was accidentally knocked overboard and drowned. returned with his family to Wynyard a few years later but died on 9 June 1898 at his property at Detention River a few miles from Table Cape and was buried in the private Alexander Cemetery on Table Cape.

Initially, Joseph moved to Table Cape but very soon he went to Circular Head, now known as Stanley, where he bought and had the licence of the *Emily Hotel* now known as the *Union Hotel*. In 1860 he and his family moved to Wynyard and took over the *Wynyard Arms Inn* on the Esplanade. In 1867, he was in charge of the *Court House Hotel*, which was probably a new name for the *Wynyard Arms Inn*. He retained the ownership of many properties in Stanley but when he died on 20 May 1878 at the age of 72 years he was described as a farmer.

Mary Reading was tried for the theft of a gown at the Old Bailey on 29 October 1832, aged 16, she was found guilty and sentenced to transportation for 7 years. She arrived in Tasmania on board the *Jane*, on the 30 June 1833. The following is a transcript of her trial at the Old Bailey. (For full details see http://www.oldbaileyonline.org)

The Proceedings of the Old Bailey, 29th November, 1832. 29. Mary Reading was indicted for stealing, on the 22nd of October, 1 gown, value 5s., the goods of Francis Healing.

ANN HEALING. I am the wife of Francis Healing – we live in Ossulton-street, St Pancras. On the 22^{nd} of October I heard a person come in and go upstairs, who I thought was my son – I called to him twice, but he did not answer – I then heard my bed-room door open; I went up, and saw the prisoner in my yard – I said, "What do you want?" she said, "I came to see a lodger of yours;" I said I had no lodger – she then went round my yard; I went to her and said, "It is curious you should come into my house without asking me," and I saw my gown in a basket in her hand, and there were some plates and knives and forks in it; the gown had been in my bed-room, where I had wrapped it up about ten minutes before – she ran away, but in about half an hour she came opposite my house; my son and another lad ran after her – this is the gown.

DAVID BARRY. I went in pursuit of the prisoner – she ran down several streets, got into a stable, and hid herself, but the dog smelt her; I went in, and found her – my face when I got her out she fought and scratched my face very much, but I got her to my mistress', who took her to the station; the dog was poisoned on the Saturday afterwards.

JOHN WALKER. (Police-constable S40). I received the prisoner, and have the property.

Prisoner's Defence. I was going with my brother's dinner, and on passing the prosecutor's I saw the gown rolled up – I took it, and put it into my basket; the prosecutrix snatched the basket from my hand, and said it was hers – I ran back to tell my mother, then went to her house, and went with her to the watch-house.







9. Removal Order for Robert Baker & Family (Wiltshire & Swindon Archives 1933/21)



The following information was found in a small book about St Luke's Church in Scone.

West of the Cook vault is the beautiful memorial to George Robert Baker who died in 1863, erected by his son Robert. The tracery of the Gothic window arch and the dove bearing an olive branch in its beak are exquisite examples of the work of the master mason Thomas Browne of Maitland and a fitting memorial to an unusual man. As a farm labourer in Wiltshire England George Robert Baker found his livelihood threatened by the Industrial Revolution - the 19th Century Machine Age. He became one of the desperate men known as Luddites, or machine breakers, who tried to stop the advance of new technology by the only means they knew. He was caught, tried and transported to New South Wales in 1831 and by good fortune was assigned to Francis Little at Invermein. Here he quickly adjusted to rural life, married Julia Bergin at St Luke's in 1842 and soon became a farm overseer. In time he prospered on his own farm on Dart Brook where he died untroubled by the noise of farm machinery.

The following information is from a book entitled *Who Was Who In The Hunter Valley Towns In 1888*, by John Turner *WILLOW TREE INN-Robert Baker Proprietor. – Mr Baker was born in Dartbrook, Scone, in 1843, and followed pastoral pursuits till 1879, when he opened a butcher's shop in Scone, and carried it on for three years.*

In 1882 he took a lease of the Willow Tree Inn, one of the oldest buildings in the town, once used as a court house, and occupied as a hotel for nearly thirty years. It was the property of Mr Jerry, and in 1887 Mr Baker became the owner of it and other properties under Mr Jerry's will. It contains about twenty-five rooms, and has an extensive connection with the outlying settlers. Mr Baker was married in 1872 to the second daughter of William Worrad of Dartbrook, and has four sons and one daughter. He is looked on in the district as a genial and obliging host and an energetic and honest citizen. His father, Mr George Robert Baker, who was born in Berkshire, England, was one of the pioneers of New South Wales, at one time being manager at Tarrindi and Invermein stations. He subsequently became proprietor of a comfortable estate in Dartbrook, and left his

family in good circumstances at the time of his death on 16th October 1862.



During the late disturbances in this District two men of the names of John Barrett and Robert Barrett were very active as ring-leaders and instigators to various acts of outrage. They are natives of Highworth in this County and led the mobs that went round this neighbourhood breaking and destroying Threshing machines etc. When their work of destruction was over in these parts and before they could be apprehended, they went away threatening to go into Buckinghamshire and join the Rioters there. Conceiving it therefore to be not improbable but that both or one of them may have been apprehended and committed to Prison in your County, we trouble you with this at the suggestion of our Magistrates, to say, that if such persons are or shall be apprehended in your neighbourhood, we request to have early information of it, there being some serious charges lodged against them here.

To assist you in this case we send on the other side as accurate a description of their persons as can be obtained from memory.

John Barrett.- is about 30 years of age, – about 5ft 9ins in height, – is a mason by Trade, – has dark brown hair and eyes, - rather a large mouth and teeth, - is stout, thick made, and dresses in a fustian frock and high shoes.

FURTHER INFORMATION ON FAMILY IN ENGLAND

David Bartlett's son William Bartlett, born at Oare, attested for the 49th Regiment of Foot at Devizes on the 22nd April 1845, at the age of 19, he was able to sign his name. He served for 4 years and 171 days, and was discharged to pension at Templemore on the 9 October 1849, at the age of 23, being unfit for further service. William served as a Private from 22 April 1845 until 1 July 1847 when he was promoted to Corporal. On 15 October 1848 he was promoted to Serjeant. His Medical Report states:



The application shows that his wife Rebecca was then in Heytesbury, near Warminster in Wiltshire with his children, Reuben age 11 years, John age 8 years, Mary Ann age 5 years, and Rebecca age 2 years. This was his second application, as the government had not been sending out families for a few years and had not responded to his earlier application. This application was recommended on the basis that he had the means to support his family upon arrival.

The application included an undertaking by a Mr Thomas Braugley, Timber Merchant & Builder, and Church Warden of Heytesbury in the year 1831 that 'they shall be no expense whatsoever to the Government, after their arrival in this Colony.' The family left for VDL in October 1834.

In the 1842 census for VDL, William Bartlett was recorded as living in the Parish of Carrick, in the Township of Illawara. At this time he was shown as the head of the household and the employer of servants. The house was described as being a completed house, built partly of brick and partly of wood, inhabited by eight people other than William, with six of these people being 'free'. All are listed as dwelling there on the night of 31 December 1841, 1 married male, 1 married female, 5 single males and 2 single females. All 9 were listed as Wesleyan Methodists. (AOTAS CEN1/37 p7)

That from the personal knowledge which your Petitioner has of the past conduct & character of her said Brother, his general honest, inoffensive, and industrious habits through the course of his life previous to the unfortunate occurrence which led to his present sentence, your Petitioner feels satisfied that in becoming implicated in the transaction which has brought him to this sentence, her said Brother has been a victim to the persuasions of violent individuals, who have, by their incitements, induced him to become an accomplice in an illegal act, which, of himself, he would have shrunk from engaging in, however pressed by poverty and distress.

With this conviction upon the mind of your Petitioner, which independent of bias which her feelings naturally lead her to in favour of an individual so nearly allied to her in blood, she believes to be a conscientious one – And as the crime for which her said Brother has been sentenced does not appear to have been of so black a character as many of those

My Lord,

Amongst the Prisoners condemned at Salisbury – for riot and machine breaking – is one William Beavan of the parish of Heytesbury, who in consequence of the excellent character which I was enabled most conscientiously to give him, received the comparatively trifling punishment of three months imprisonment in the House of Correction at Devizes.

As the committing Magistrate it was most painful to me to send for trial a man with whom I have been acquainted for many years – whose family is highly respectable & whose character up to the moment of the riot at Heytesbury was irreproachable. I regretted still more the circumstance knowing that he had never before been within the walls of a prison.

His sentence, My Lord, has been a lenient one, but so anxious am I to prevent his being contaminated by the lawless set he must associate with at Devizes, that I am induced strongly to recommend his case to your Lordship's favourable consideration, satisfied that should he be pardoned on the present occasion, he will never again forget

himself; and I shall have a moral hold upon him, - the strongest guarantee for his future good behaviour.



In 1867 the proprietors of the property were the executors of the late Robert Whiteway and in 1873 and 1874 the proprietor was Isaac Blake. Isaac also rented up to 50 acres of arable land in Bothwell, owned by various people, including his father.

(Hobart Town Gazette 26 February 1867) In the 1872 Roll he leased 400 acres of the same land and also a house and ground in Dalrymple Street, Bothwell, the property of Robert Whiteway, executor of S Blackwell, S Arnett agent. (Hobart Town Gazette 20 February 1872) His brother Joseph leased the remaining 500 acres of the 900 acre Grantham property. Charles Blake was not mentioned in the 1874 Bothwell Assessment Roll.

DEATH: 23 April 1873, age 68 years, Bothwell District. Informant was Isaac Blake, son, who stated that his father was a landholder and died from 'bronchitis and softening of the brain'. (AOTAS RGD35 –1873-2)

FURTHER INFORMATION: In January 1842 Robert Blake and John Bowden were in partnership on a farm leased in the Bothwell district. By January 1848 Robert Blake was described as a farmer and was living in his own brick house in Bothwell. Living with him was his wife, and four male and four female children under 14. (AOTAS CEN1/74 p169 - See illustration on pages 132 & 133) The valuation roll for the town of Bothwell, which appears in the *Hobart Town Gazette*, 18 May 1858, shows that Blake resided on his own property of thirty acres, with a house. A supplement roll

which appears in the *Hobart Town Gazette*, 21 December 1858, shows that he owned at least three other houses in the township. By 1872 he is listed as the proprietor of the house in which he was living and also of seven rented houses and 30 acres of arable land. On the Bothwell Assessment Roll for 1874 (*Hobart Town Gazette*, 3 February 1874) all of the properties were under the proprietorship of the executors of Robert Blake and remained under executor control until at least 1876.

The following article, relating to Robert Blake's sons William and Isaac, appeared in the *Tasmanian Mail*, 21 February 1885.

Mr William Blake, one of the carriers between Bothwell and the capital, conducts a brewery in the township, and his brother Mr Isaac Blake intends, as soon as the place is repaired, to enter the lists at the Jolly Hatters, Melville Street, Hobart, against the mammoth Cascades Company. The Blakes have been brewers for many years at Bothwell, enjoying much success, hence the projected Hobart branch. The malt liquors at the Bothwell Brewery are of exceptionally high quality – mild, clear, sparkling, and free from the tendency to acidity so general in colonial ale ... I have no hesitation in placing the well matured amber contents of a puncheon of Mr Blake's stillions side by side with the best imported draught, and but little, if any, behind in quality finest Bass bottled by Stone or Foster.

Isaac Blake bought the *Jolly Hatters* in 1885 and in the 1890's the turnover was said to be £6,000 per annum. It was bought by the Cascade Brewery Company in 1922.

Robert Blake's wife, Mary Bowden, was the daughter of Edward Bowden who had arrived in VDL in 1827 on board the *Governor Ready*, having been sentenced to 7 years transportation for receiving stolen fowls. In August 1828 Bowden petitioned the Colonial Secretary to allow his wife, Dinah, and their five children to be sent out to join him. At the time they were living at Rockland in Norfolk. It is not known when the family arrived in VDL but daughter Mary's first child, Louisa, was born in 1834. Mary's sister, Sarah, married William North, another rioter from Wiltshire, in 1841. An Edward Bowden died in Tasmania on 20

September 1858, age 62, ((AOTAS RGD35-158-20) and a Diana Bowden died in Tasmania on 25 November 1866, age 71. (AOTAS RGD35-1866-18)

The bearer, who with his Father, are very respectable yeoman, are anxious if possible to obtain a remission of the sentence in favour of the man who has uniformly borne a good character for 20 years, during which time he lived in the Father's service, and as the judges have left Salisbury, I thought I might advise them to wait upon you in order that they might learn from the highest authority, what course they should pursue, that their statement may reach its proper destination

One (of the name of Case) has five children, the other named Brown has one child about 7 years old and two sons grown up, one of who is married and has an infant a year or two old. They all wish to go.

My son William Cheater, was unfortunately involved in the riots of 1830, and was shortly after tried at Salisbury and sentenced to Transportation for Life. It was the first act of Insubordination he was ever guilty of, and in this act he was drawn aside by thoughtless and wicked companions, rather than by any innate propensity to rebellion. Since he has been at Sydney, his uniformly good behaviour, has gained him the confidence of those under whom he was placed, and he appears to be comfortably settled, but, most earnestly wishes for the privilege of paying one visit to his native country for a short time that he may see his aged mother again before she dies. Could you Sir, condescendingly use your influence to bring about this wished for object, you would confer an inestimable favour on a poor aged widow, a favour for which, as the only return in her power, she will pray that the Blessing of Almighty God may ever rest on yourself and your Family.



The Humble Petition of Henry Dickets To His Most Gracious Majesty

Your Most Gracious Majesty will I hope excuse the great liberty I have taken in laying before your Majesty a true statement of the facts of my unfortunate Confinement but knowing that your Majesty is equal in the distribution of your Justice to the meanest of your Majesty's subjects as well as to the great and Rich wich I trust will prove some little excuse for the great liberty I have taken in addressing your Royal Personage

Most Gracious Sovereign on the 22nd of November I was proceeding to my Work at a Place called Winterbourne in the County of Wilts when I met a man whose name was Lodge who told me there was a great Row at Winterbourne on the preceding evening wich I took no kind of notice of but went forward to my Work when about 12 o'clock my Employer ordered all his working men to go up to the Church wich we accordingly did and shortly afterwards a great number of farmers assembled together to consult with each other about

raising the mens wages and after they had consulted some time they came to a conclusion and addressed the men and told them they had come to an agreement between themselves to raise their wages and told them they would in future give them ten shillings per week wich the men refused and said why not they have twelve a Man there a Baker from Winterbourne who said Gentlemen you all know that I am Pounds and Pounds out of pocket by the men owing to their not having more than six or seven shillings per week wich you know is not enough and as every other Parish has twelve I think for my part they ought to have the same and as you have now stoped them all from their work they must now be blind if they do not now have a right under standing before they go to work again when a Gentleman named Cush replied no doubt but what you say is true I believe that is the regular price and if the rest of the farmer's will give twelve shillings I will give the same and do away with all Machinery the men replied then we will go up the Bourne and ask the rest of the farmers they then if one goes let us all go I was then returning back to my Work but hearing someone running I looked back and saw a number of men some of whom took me by the collar of my Coat and asked me where I was going when I replied that I was going to my Work they then said be d - d if I should not go with them they then began to use me very ill and swore if I offered to turn back again or attempted to go to my work they would murder me on the spot they then force me along with blows from sticks and other weapons until I through fear of being murdered asked them how far they were going they said only just up here to Mr Bowles farm and without any further hesitation forced me along with them guite against my inclination they then went to the door and knocked and asked if Mr Bowles was at home and as they stood at the Door I ran away they then turned round and saw me running and followed me across a field and caught me and again began to ill use me I told them I wanted to go home for I had no victuals to eat the whole of the day and I had a long way to go home they then said if I offered to go another step that way or offered to refuse going with them they would butcher me they then placed a stick between my legs and carried me about 40 or 50 yards whereby I sustained a very serious injury I then

cried out and begged for mercy some of the men then turned round and said don't hurt the fellow and ordered them to release me they put me down and took me by the arms for I was quite unable to stand without assistance from the injury I had sustained from their ill usage the effect of which I feel up the present time they then dragged me on with them to several farmer's houses till we came near a public house I then told them I could not go any farther my stockings and shoes being so bad and I was ready to die for want they then permitted me to go into the Public House and pulled my stockings and shoes off and said to me wont it be better for you to have 10 or 12 shillings per week than 4 wich is all you now get and some of them said he wants it as much as we and he shall try and get it as well as others they then forced me out of the house with them and said they would soon procure me something to eat when they came up with several other labouring men who they likewise pressed and very much ill treated but after we had proceeded about a mile and a half myself and three others of the fresh pressed men agreed to run away from them and hid away from them in a wood wich was near at hand wich we were about doing but where frustrated in our attempt by one of the men who immediately told the others of our intention and they directly began to beat us with sticks until I fainted from the injury I had sustained and was not sensible of any thing else that passed until some time after when I recovered and found myself bleeding in the road therefore your Majesty may perceive how ill used I have been and how reluctantly I have been drawn into a crime wich I never meditated and am now under sentence of seven years transportation wich I hope your Majesty will take into your Royal Consideration and not suffer me to be so innocently a sufferer of such a punishment

Henry Dickets as worked for me this last 2 years and I always found him to be a steady and well behaved Lad

I acknowledge the receipt of your Lordship's Letter this morning relative to my petition in behalf of Peter Withers and James Lush, for which I beg leave to express my sincerest gratitude. A poor woman has requested me to inclose this petition in behalf of her son, now under sentence of transportation in Fisherton Gaol. His character is attested by his Master while he was in Salisbury, and by the Minister of the parish while at Winterbourne, where he used to go to work, when Trade was dull in the City. This will account for his being at that place on the day of the Riot. His story is plain and simple, and the greater part of which was deposed to on his Trial. They were (his friends) desirous that I should assist them I drawing up a petition stating the facts but in a different form. I however have thought it better to send it as it is, and in the hope that you will be pleased to lay it before his Majesty.

To The Right Honourable the Secretary of State My Lord,

I take the liberty of addressing you on a subject which I fear has of late occupied much of your precious time, but the consideration that I am acting solely in the cause of my poor & unfortunate fellow creatures as also Parishioners will I trust be deemed by your Lordship an apology for the intrusion.

During the late Riots which unhappily prevailed in the County, William Lewis, Henry Shergold & James Down with five others were found guilty of breaking machinery in this Town & sentenced to transportation for life, the wives of the above named three, the only married persons, suffering perhaps more than the Convicts themselves, from the loss of their husbands support & acknowledging them kind & affectionate Parents, are desirous if possible to join them. To this purpose I interest myself in their behalf, & anxiously wait your Lordships opinion, whether Government would sanction such a proceeding, & further, whether Government would give any assistance for the prosecution of this charitable act.

I should inform your Lordship that a part of the Rewards given for the apprehension of the offenders was allotted to these unfortunate women, who are most willing to give their portion for the furtherance of this their desired object, & I think I may venture to say the Parish will also contribute, for the purpose of conveying it into effect.

Should emigration be desirable to the Colony whither the Convicts are sent (to us unknown) the following statement would perhaps be some little inducement to accede to the earnest request of these suffering, tho' not less deserving females.

Elizabeth wife of William Lewis aged 31 years, four children, 3 girls & 1 boy the eldest 7 y^{rs} the youngest 8 months.

Fanny wife of Henry Shergold aged 31 years, 5 children, 4 girls & 1 boy the eldest 10 y^{rs} the youngest 6 months.

Harriet wife of James Down aged 26 years just on the point of being confined with her first child.



FURTHER INFORMATION: William Durham gives his place of birth as Fort George, America (it should perhaps be Canada), which seems to suggest that his father was a soldier. A Thomas Durham, 'of Marston, near the town of Swindon', enlisted in the 41st Regiment of Foot at Tavistock, Devon, on the 25 April 1805, age 24, for unlimited service. The 41st were at Fort George around the time of William's supposed date of birth. By the time of his discharge, at Londonderry on the 17 November 1818, Thomas had reached the rank of Corporal. The reason given for his discharge is, in consequence of a reduction in the Establishment of the Regiment.' At the time of his discharge Thomas Durham is described at 38 years of age, 5' 6" in height, dark hair, grey eyes, dark complexion, and by trade a labourer. (see Discharge Document - TNA WO97/570) Thomas and his family appear to have returned to Wiltshire and the baptism of 4 children to him and his wife Annie appear in the baptism registers of Bishopstone, near Swindon, as follows:-



FURTHER INFORMATION: (Kindly supplied by Professor G B Sharman) Thomas Foot(e) applied in early 1832 to have his wife, Betsey, and children: Amelia (aged 5), Sarah (3½), Margaret (1½) and an infant sent out to Australia. (AOTAS CO280/34 Reel 251 p92, GO 33/10 p845)

The family arrived in Hobart per female convict transport *William Bryan* on the 23rd October 1833. (AOTAS MB2/39/1 p431)

At the 1842 Van Diemen's Land Census no person recognisable as Thomas Foot(e) was present and Elizabeth Foot, was named as the householder and person in charge. (AOTAS CEN 1/33 p49)

Thomas Foot(e) presumably went to the Port Phillip Colony (later Victoria) soon after emancipation; he is known to have arrived in Launceston on 14 July (Launceston *Advertiser 17* July 1845) and to have returned to Port Phillip on 2 October 1845. (Launceston *Examiner 2* October 1845)

There is no record of Thomas Foot(e)'s death in Tasmania; he is presumably the Thomas Foote who died in 1866 in Victoria, age 64, birthplace given as Wilts. (RGVIC 1866 41860)

FURTHER INFORMATION: The following extract can be found in *Hunter's River (NSW)* by Cecily J Mitchell (1984 edition) The original letter is in the Dinton - Dalwood Letters p42, Mitchell Library, Sydney.

When our last letters to you were written the whole country was in an uproar, as well as two or three of the adjoining ones. William and his yeomen certainly stopped the rioters from going into Somersetshire; no riots have taken place there yet, and I trust the whole kingdom will soon be guiet again. The Special Assizes took place at Salisbury last week, before three Judges, and a great many prisoners are sentenced to transportation. Two are to be hanged, I hear, one of them for having very nearly killed Mr Oliver Codrington with a sledge hammer in one of the rows in North Wiltshire; the prisoner was not content with knocking him off his horse, but struck him when on the ground and it was some hours before Mr Oliver C. could be brought to life, and he remained insensible for two or three days. He is now pretty well recovered, and is extremely annoyed to find that the Judges of the Capital have sentenced the man to death, as he would not allow the surgeon who attended him to be examined in Court, fearing that such would be the case, and I hear he has desired the counsel to find a flaw, if possible, by which he may escape. The other case is for extorting money.

I think these convicts will be most valuable servants to you and other settlers in New South Wales, I fancy they will not be inclined to quarrel with the machines they will find there. Government has very wisely determined not to send the poor men to the hulks, previous to leaving England, to be made more wicked, but a vessel is now lying off Portsmouth to take them to Botany Bay as soon as possible. No doubt

you remember a notorious poacher and evil-disposed person of the name of Jack Ford, alias Henwood, belonging to the parish of Upper Tefont, who always wired all the hares and pheasants in Twickthorn and the adjoining copses. He joined a part near Wilton, assisted in breaking machines, and doing other violence there. At Barford he headed a mob, and broke Mr Nicholson's mill, and then went on to Ono Shipman's house, and declared he would have gold or blood, so Ono gave him a sovereign. These last two offences have transported him for life, much to the joy of William Barnes and Jim Viney. Papa has done his utmost to get one of the men's sentences mitigated, but has not succeeded. He is a native of Chicksgrove or Tisbury, and is a blacksmith. He has always been reckoned the most quiet, industrious young man in the parish. He was absolutely collared and taken out of his father's house by violence; but, of course, when his spirit was up he was active enough, and being a blacksmith he well knew how to break the plows and rollers. Now don't laugh at me very much for what follows, because I know that there is hardly a chance of your ever seeing poor Edmund White, but if you do, don't forget that Papa has interested himself in his behalf. He has seven years to spend at Botany Bay.

Dear Lamb,

I am encouraged by your letter received this evening to report to you an application, which I made to Mr Baron Vaughan at Salisbury in behalf of 4 lads who were capitally convicted at the last Special Assize for Robbery.

Their names are Jeremiah New - John Thorne - David Gee. and Worthy Gee. They were included in an Indictment with a man of the name of Watts. This last was a stout man of, I suppose, 28 or 29 years of age: the other four were lads. I was present at the trial: the evidence was conclusive against them all; but there were no aggravating circumstances. The Jury found them all Guilty, but recommended the four lads to mercy. One of the Gee's called on Spicer to his character; but he did not answer. On a subsequent day I saw Spicer, who turned out to be a man, whom I have known some years ago, a very respectable yeoman; ..., I think, to the ity of that class. He then told me that he very much regretted that he had not been present to speak in behalf of these lads, and was very desirous to make application in their behalf. At his desire it was that I spoke to Mr Baron Vaughan. He knew more of the two Gees than of the others; but he knew them all, being on the Parish to which they belonged. He told me that he was confident that they had been driven away by others; that they were quiet lads, but very poor; that had been of late working for the Parish at 3/- per week at the very outside, and that they deserved the most merciful consideration. I enclose to you a note he subsequently sent to me respecting them, with an enclosure.

Dear Lamb,

I am encouraged by your letter received this evening to report to you an application, which I made to Mr Baron Vaughan at Salisbury in behalf of 4 lads who were capitally convicted at the <u>last Special Assize for Robbery</u>.

Their names are Jeremiah New – John Thorne – David Gee, and Worthy Gee. They were included in an Indictment with a man of the name of Watts. This last was a stout man of, I suppose, 28 or 29 years of age: the other four were lads. I was present at the trial: the evidence was conclusive against them all; but there were no aggravating circumstances. The Jury found them all Guilty, but recommended the four lads to mercy. One of the Gee's called on Spicer to his character; but

he did not answer. On a subsequent day I saw Spicer, who turned out to be a man, whom I have known some years ago, a very respectable yeoman; ..., I think, to the ity of that class. He then told me that he very much regretted that he had not been present to speak in behalf of these lads, and was very desirous to make application in their behalf. At his desire it was that I spoke to Mr Baron Vaughan. He knew more of the two Gees than of the others; but he knew them all, being on the Parish to which they belonged. He told me that he was confident that they had been driven away by others; that they were quiet lads, but very poor; that had been of late working for the Parish at 3/- per week at the very outside, and that they deserved the most merciful consideration. I enclose to you a note he subsequently sent to me respecting them, with an enclosure.

1. To the Kings Most Excellent Majesty May it please your Majesty

We your Majesty's most Loyal and Dutiful subjects being inhabitants of Hungerford and Ramsbury in the Counties of Berks and Wilts, humbly and earnestly solicit your Majesty's merciful attention to the Prayer of this our Petition.

Sincerely deploring as we do the general distress which pervades the Country, and, which in part occasioned the proceedings we deprecate, but knowing that your Majesty has on various occasions shown a greater disposition to Mercy than to severity in Judgement. We therefore with the most profound respect approach your Royal Person, and implore Mercy on Thomas Goddard the poor deluded and unfortunate young man who is now at Salisbury, under the awful Sentence of Transportation for seven years.

We beg leave most humbly to impress upon your Majesty's most gracious mind, That when Thomas Goddard joined the assembled Peasantry his avowed purpose (so expressed to several respectable Persons), was to prevent as much as he could any serious mischief, and with such motive his endeavours on the occasion were observed to correspond.

We further most humbly beg to call your Majesty's most gracious attention to the Character of this unfortunate young man, - That previous to the time of his being seen among this unlawful Assemblage, his character was without a stain. In early life he was meek and unoffending, and is at present only twenty seven years of age. He has been a dutiful son, an affectionate Husband, and a kind Father – to the persons in his employ a kind and indulgent Master.

Your Petitioners unfeignedly regret that under the existing circumstances of the case, no Mercy save that of the Crown, can be extended to the prisoner, Thomas Goddard who has thus offended.

We therefore most fervently entreat an immediate Revocation of his sentence, so that he may once more be restored to his Wife, Family and Friends.

Your Petitioners look with the confidence of children to your Majesty as their Father, and humbly cry for Mercy on this hapless young man.

That at the late Special Commission and Gaol Delivery held at New Sarum on and for the County of Wilts Thomas Goddard of Ramsbury aforesaid Tanner was convicted of Robbery from the Person of the above named Richard Church during the late Riots and Disturbances in the County of Wilts, and the sentence of Death was recorded against the said Thomas Goddard and that the learned Judge intimated to the said Thomas Goddard that his sentence would not be commuted to less than seven years Transportation.

Your Petitioners also beg to state that there were three other charges of a similar nature against the said Thomas Goddard at the same Assize upon which the above named William Brown William Woodman and William Spearing were respectively bound in Recognizance to prosecute him, but neither the learned Judge nor the counsel for the Crown considered it requisite that those cases should be tried, as the conviction of the said Thomas Goddard upon the first charge would be sufficient to answer the ends of Justice,

Your Petitioners since their return home from the Assize have heard that a Petition is being got up and considerable interest is being used to obtain a commutation of the sentence of the said Thomas Goddard to imprisonment for a short period.

Therefore they respectfully submit to your Lordship, that under the circumstances of this case as hereinbefore stated the commutation of the sentence of the said Thomas Goddard should not be less than seven years transportation inasmuch as they consider the said Thomas Goddard to have been the Leader of the mob and his respectable situation in Life to have been an aggravation of his crime, and a remission of his sentence to less than transportation for seven years would, in the opinion of your Petitioners be much calculated to weaken the effect which this case ought to produce as an example to others.

My Lord,

Pardon the great liberty I take in addressing your Lordship, as I am constrained by the greatest distress and misery that any human being can be in. I am the wife of Thomas Goddard of Ramsbury, now under sentence of Transportation for being concerned in the late Riots. We were in a comfortable way of Business; but are now entirely ruined, and myself and Child are in a most afflicted condition from having lost our only support.

It is true, My Lord, my husband was with the Rioters part of one day, but his intention was to do no harm to any one; and his Character till that unfortunate day was so good that the Revd Dr Meyrick Vicar of our place and a Magistrate for the County, though in a very ill state of health went over to Salisbury on purpose to speak for him. If your Lordship would refer to the notes of these Judges, or take the trouble of writing to Dr Meyrick, you will be convinced that I tell you nothing but the truth. I do not ask you, My Lord, to give him a free pardon I only intreat that he may not be sent out of the Country. Oh! My Lord permit me to beg that your Lordship will write, and enquire into his former Character, and you will find that I shall be borne out in every thing that I have said.

Dear Sir,

I herewith forward you a Testimonial of the character of Thos Goddard whose case Mr David Orchard mentioned to you on Friday last – he was a Tanner at Ramsbury, and at the time of the Riots in 1830 rode over to Aubourne the adjoining village, when he arrived there the Rioters had just broken a machine belonging to a Mr Church and demanded a Sovereign for so doing – Mr Church being intimidated, complied, and expressed a desire to know the person to whom he gave the Sovereign the party then called out for Mr Goddard to receive the money for them, which he did, and immediately handed it over to the person whom they represented as their purse keeper – Mr Church on the trial deposed that Goddard was the person to whom he gave the sovereign which evidence caused his conviction.

He left, at that time, his Mother his Wife and child, but since his transportation, his Mother & Wife have both died of grief, and his property which he left behind him, is now, in consequence of his absence, in a very precarious state.



FURTHER INFORMATION: (Kindly supplied by Margaret Buckland)

In 1839 Richard Groves arrived in the Port Phillip district of NSW (later Victoria) aboard the *Tamar*, which left Launceston on 20 March. In August 1840 Richard married Mary Moran. Mary, a bounty immigrant had arrived from Ireland on the *Andromache* two months previously. The 1841 Census of Port Phillip lists the couple living in a hut at South Melbourne – an area south of the Yarra favoured by brickmakers. Late in 1842 Richard and Mary were living in Geelong.

In Geelong Richard was a brickmaker on his own account. His name appears in early Directories and rate Payer Lists at various addresses – Church, Pakington and Isabella Streets – and around the Kildare Estate.

Richard and Mary had 6 children between 1842 and 1848, all baptised at St Mary of the Angels Catholic Church.

Their eldest son, Richard, born in October 1842 was the 21st child to be baptised in St Mary of the Angels Catholic Church, which had been recently built from logs.

Richard seems to have been relatively prosperous during the 1840's and 1850's. The children were sent to school. In 1848 he advertised six bullocks and equipment for sale. He purchased a number of blocks of land on which he erected a small dwelling, sheds and a kiln, then converted the clay into the pleasantly light-coloured bricks still to be seen in Geelong's early buildings.

Reminiscences of an early resident quoted in *The Ashby Story* by Gladys Seaton, include, 'Brickmaking was thirsty work, especially during the kiln drying, a task which took three days and nights. The brickmakers of Ashby featured from time to time in reports of quarrelling and drunkenness.' Police notes in *The Geelong Advertiser* show that Richard was one of the Quarrellers and that he and his wife were at times drunk and disorderly. Perhaps Richard's fractiousness was in his genes – his one prior conviction back in Wiltshire was for assault and he displayed a 'short fuse' as a convict. The trait was passed on – items from the Donald newspapers show that his descendants, at least his younger sons were regularly involved in petty brawling during the 1870's and 1880's.

In March 1860 Mary Groves died in the Geelong Hospital. Only one reference to Richard appears in the Rate-payers list after this date and his death does not appear to have been registered or investigated under any recognisable name. It is assumed that without Mary he became a vagrant and is one of the many 'unknown' males buried at Geelong.

In 1893, at Ballarat, Richard's grandson, John Thomas Orchard, eldest son of Sarah Jane. Married Mary Griffin, grand daughter of Thomas Reed, also a Machine Breaker who was transported on the *Eliza*.

All of Richard's children had large families, as have many of their descendants in succeeding generations. Several hundred descendants of Richard Groves, Machine Breaker, are now living – most of them unaware of their ancestor's story.





He applied for permission to marry Harriet Thorney, convict per *Majestic*, on 10 December 1842 (AOTAS CON 52/2 p82) and they were married on 13 February 1843 at Great Swanport, VDL (AOTAS RGD37-1843-695).

At the 1848 VDL Census (AOTAS CEN 1/78 p121) James House was classified as a farmer and the person in charge of wooden house at Spring Vale, Great Swanport, owned by Charles Meredith, a prominent local pastoralist. He was sharing the house with a 21-45 year old married female, obviously his wife Harriet, and three male farm servants two of whom were ex-convicts and one of whom was on ticket-of-leave.

James House died 9 December 1850 at Spring Vale, of 'apoplexy caused by functional derangement of heart' (AOTAS SC195/28, Inquest No. 2446) and was buried at Oatlands (AOTAS RGD34-1850-51).

Harriet Thorney, a 25 year old shoe binder from Hull, was sentenced at Stafford Quarter Sessions 3 April 1838 to ten year's transportation for stealing money, etc. She arrived in VDL per female convict transport *Majestic* 21 January 1839. Many of the Persons who have signed are known to your Lordship – upwards of a hundred are personally known to me as respectable good men.

The Boy Jennings has no Parents. He has written to Salisbury (his Letter before me) "He has worked at his Trade since he has been there, has no wish to leave or any desire to return to England. He is only anxious to have Leave to work on his own account in the Colony"

Should any Remission or a Ticket of Liberty be allowed - I am authorized by some who have signed this Petition to say, they will send Him out Tools and the means of establishing Himself as a Mechanic – as He was clever in his Business as a White or Blacksmith before he was led away by Persuasion & Example.

Her Conduct Record (AOTAS CON 40/1) was sent to the Richmond Police Office 03 February 1835 and has no emancipation details except for an endorsement 'Free Certificate No 279 1843'.

At the 1842 VDL Census (AOTAS CEN1/41 p49) William Kibblewhite was the householder, employer of servants and person in charge of a finished wooden house at Clapstone Point, Sorell, Richmond District, VDL, of which the proprietor was Silas Gatehouse, to whom Kibblewhite had been originally assigned. The seven persons generally residing in the house were a married female and a married male, an unmarried female and three unmarried males and two children. Assuming that the married male and female were William and Mary Kibblewhite and that the two children were theirs it may also be assumed that William was farming one of Gatehouse's properties in his own right and was employing one female and three male servants all of whom were free. No records of children born to Mary and William Kibblewhite have been found.

No later record of the presence of William Kibblewhite or any member of his family was found in VDL/Tasmania and he is presumed to have left the Colony. It is possible that Mary (Bowen) Kibblewhite picked up her free certificate in 1843 in preparation for departure.

They were sentenced to be confined in the House of Correction at Devizes for three calendar months, with hard labour. At midnight on the 21st of April 1834 fire broke out in the extensive farm buildings belonging to the Reverend M H Goodman at Oare, and Charles Kimmer confessed to having started the fire. Kimmer also confessed to having been present when the brand was applied to the premises of Mr

I trust you will excuse the liberty I take in addressing you on this subject but being informed you was the only Person who could render me any assistance (and you being so well acquainted with my person) I doubted not but you would bestow any favour on me you justifiably could. About five years ago when I had a good share of business I took a lad by the name of Abraham Knight as an apprentice (but ever since then my business have been declining) and having nothing for him to do (and unable to support him) I was compelled to find him another master and about four months ago he went to work for a man by the name of Parish at Latton near Cricklade and conducted himself in a very becoming manner until the 25 of November when there arose a Mob at Cricklade and destroyed the Machines and proceeded from thence to Latton and finding Abraham Knight stood at his Masters door compelled him to accompany them to a Mr Tylers where they destroyed a thrashing machine and for which Abraham is sentenced to Seven years transportation and I can (if required) find a dozen men (even Mr Tyler's own labourers) that will swear that Abraham Knight did not assist in destroying the thrashing machine and that he was forced from his home by the mob. I applied

to an Attorney for advice when he informed me you could get his punishment mitigated by applying to the Home Secretary, and as he is innocent of the charge and suffering wrongfully I humbly trust you will intercede for him.

(Devizes & Wiltshire Gazette, Thursday January 27, 1831) To the King's Most Excellent Majesty

The humble and earnest Petition of Henry Hunt, of 36 Stamford Street, in the parish of Christchurch, in the County of Surrey:

Showeth, - That your petitioner has visited Salisbury, in order to obtain correct information as to the cases of two unfortunate men condemned to death, and left for execution at the county gaol of Fisherton, by the names of Lush and Withers, as well as to enquire into the cases of some of those unhappy men who have received sentences of transportation for writing threatening letters, and for machine-breaking.

As to the more important cases of Lush and Withers, the former has been from poverty most unfortunately situated. – When committed to gaol, and before his trial came on, he sent for an attorney, and placed in his hands, confidentially, a full and clear confession of his guilty participation in the offences with which he stood charged. This confession, so confidentially made to his attorney (by an extraordinary rule of the gaol), the legal advisor was compelled to submit to the inspection of the gaoler, which paper he kept in his hands for several days, and in all human probability this document, or a copy of it, was either submitted to the inspection of the

Judge, or placed in the hands of the prosecutor, The Crown Solicitor, or the Attorney General: when this man was brought up for trial, such was his extreme poverty, that he could not raise a guinea to fee counsel, and he was left destitute, without legal advise of assistance of any sort.

Your Petitioner submits to your Majesty, that the prisoner Lush, awaits his fate, under the conviction that he has been betrayed, and that he is about to suffer the extreme penalty of the law more from this misfortune than from any crime that he had been guilty of.

The case of Withers is, perhaps, more entitled to your Majesty's most gracious consideration. He was, up to the time of committing the offence, a man of exemplary good character, he has a wife and five children. When he was attacked by the prosecutor in a most ferocious manner, with a hunting-whip with a heavy iron hammer at the end of it, neither Withers nor his companions were committing any act of violence; Withers having received repeated blows with this formidable and deadly weapon (a hunting whip), retaliated by throwing a hammer at the prosecutor, which missed him, having afterwards been crushed against a wall by the prosecutors horse, he retaliated again, by throwing the hammer a second time, which took effect, and produced the wound or blow for which the prisoner was capitally convicted, under Lord Ellenborough's act; but your Majesty will please to observes, that the hammer, with which the wound was said to be given, was never produced in court, nor was any surgeon examined as to the nature and extent of the wound inflicted.

Under these peculiar circumstances, your humble petitioner begs most respectfully and most earnestly to implore your Majesty to extend your Royal Clemency to the two unfortunate beings, Lush and Withers, who are now awaiting their fate, trusting that your Majesty's benevolent and humane heart will extend to them that mercy in this world which all will stand in need of when the dreadful day of judgement shall come, before Him who makes no distinction between Kings, and their subjects.

2. My Lord,

The Friends of Thomas Smith, William Midwinter, and William Rodbourne, all of this Parish, now confined in the County Gaol of Devizes, under sentence of Imprisonment for one year for rioting and breaking machinery in November last, have earnestly requested me to join with them in an humble petition to his Majesty's Government, that the above mentioned prisoners may be immediately liberated, on the grounds that James Moulden of this Parish also, sentenced at the same time, for the same offence, and for the same length of confinement, has already been set at liberty.

With great reluctance generally to interfere in the case of persons, whose improper conduct has rendered them answerable to the Laws, yet a sense of Justice compels me in the present instance to say, that I can see no possible reason for the distinction in the above cases: and therefore as mercy has been extended to one Prisoner I feel myself bound to join in the petition that the same lenity may be extended to the three others: They have already been confined for more than half the time to which they were sentenced, and their former Employers speak favourably of their Characters, previously to their conduct on the late occasion.

I have to acknowledge the favor of a Letter, written by your Lordship's command, in answer to an application which I had taken the liberty of making in behalf of Thomas Smith, William Midwinter, and William Rodbourne, now confined in Devizes gaol, praying that it might be taken into consideration whether the same lenity might not be shown in regard to those three prisoners as had previously been shown to James Moulden, who had been tried for the same offence, & had received the same sentence. Your Lordship was pleased to express a desire, previous to taking the case into consideration; that the sentiments of the magistrate who committed the Prisoners together with a more explicit report of the previous character of these persons might be obtained, accordingly, I enclose a letter written to me upon the subject by Lieut Col Vilett, who committed these men, and also statements respecting their previous character from those by whom they were last employed.

At this season of the year in the midst of Harvest, there can be no doubt of immediate labour being found for the men, should his Majesty's Government think fit to release them.

I beg to express my sincere thanks for the obliging manner in which your Lordship has replied to my application, which was dictated purely by a feeling, that cases as far as I can discover, in all respects similar, should upon principles of equal justice be treated alike.

6. My Dear Bouverie

I am just returned from Winchester and am sorry to say I was too late to see you.

With regard to these four men, viz Moulden, Rodbourne, Midwinter, & Smith, finding that at the request of Mr James Crowdy one of them, viz Moulden, had been liberated, I forwarded the Petition of the friends of the other three to Lord Melbourne taking the liberty of recommending it earnestly to his Lordship's notice. The principle on which I proceeded was, that as the four men had been found guilty of the same offence, & had received the same sentence, it seems hard that one should be enjoying his liberty five months before the

others, especially as they were all spoken equally well of by their former employers. From all I can learn there is no difference whatever in their previous characters; & in the present scrape they were all similarly involved. Col. Vilett, who committed them agreed with me in this view of the case, and allowed me to enclose his opinion in the packet to Lord M.

As they are not liberated, I conclude that now they have requested the more powerful assistance of Lord Radnor. His Lordship will of course act according to his own very good judgement in such matters. All I can say is that upon a principal of equal justice, it seemed to me that as the case of all was the same, & their character the same, they all ought to meet the same fate. It is the first time I ever interfered for prisoners after sentence, and should not have done so now, if a successful interference for one of the parties had not been excited.

9. Dear Phillipps,

I have looked at my note of the case of Midwinter & Rodbourne. <u>According to it Smith was acquitted</u> – a man of the name of Selwood was however convicted with the two former, but he was imprisoned only for 6 months & his period is expired.

The other two were imprisoned for 12 months. There was nothing peculiar in their case. It was an ordinary case of breaking a thrashing machine unaccompanied by any circumstances of violence to person or to the other property of the prosecutor. No distinction whatever exists between their cases. If either receives any mitigation of their sentence both ought to receive it. <u>Selwood</u> had a very good char^r. The others had a fair one – but not so good as his.

But I really think on the whole that they were leniently dealt with & that under existing circumstances & considering the state of the western counties it will not be expedient to mitigate the sentence. However, the case is for Lord Melbourne's better Judg^t. There is nothing in the report which will at all assist you but if you wish it my clerk shall copy my note (which is a very short one) of the ...

Your petitioner humbly submits to your Majesty, that her husband was at work in his master's Barn, when a mob to the amount of 200, forced him away from his work, under a threat that if he did not, they would compel him to go by violence. He had neither, stick nor stones, in his hands a no Hammer, no Instrument of destruction whatever, that he was present is true, but he was so under coercive circumstances.

He is a married man, has five children whom he has supported by his Industry, and the highest confidence is placed not only in your Majesty's <u>feeling</u>, but also in your <u>Judgement</u>.

A letter has been received this morning from your office by a poor woman of this parish named Rebecca Bartlett, which allows her to embark with her four children for Van Diemen's Land in order to join her husband, who was transported to that Colony at the time of the Agricultural Riots. The official letter is dated the 27th September, and it is therein stated that the ship will sail on the 11th September. The poor woman has applied to me as a Magistrate to explain this confusion of dates, which I apprehend to be merely a clerical error. I shall be most obliged to you to inform me whether October be not the month appointed for the sailing of the ship rather than September. I shall also be obliged to you if you say where this poor woman is to join the ship. I find that the Overseers of this Parish have applied to you to extend this favor to Sarah Smith & her 3 children, placed under exactly similar circumstances, who would be most happy to be allowed to

accompany Rebecca Bartlett. May I request you to favor me with an answer to that application.

There is still another woman, named Betty Munday, who is also desirous of joining her husband, who was transported to Van Diemen's Land at the same time with the others.

Dear Lamb,

I am encouraged by your letter received this evening to report to you an application, which I made to Mr Baron Vaughan at Salisbury in behalf of 4 lads who were capitally convicted at the <u>last Special Assize for Robbery</u>.

Their names are Jeremiah New – John Thorne – David Gee, and Worthy Gee. They were included in an Indictment with a man of the name of Watts. This last was a stout man of, I suppose, 28 or 29 years of age: the other four were lads. I was present at the trial: the evidence was conclusive against them all; but there were no aggravating circumstances. The Jury found them all Guilty, but recommended the four lads to mercy. One of the Gee's called on Spicer to his character; but

he did not answer. On a subsequent day I saw Spicer, who turned out to be a man, whom I have known some years ago, a very respectable yeoman; I ..., I think, to theabilty of that class. He then told me that he very much regretted that he had not been present to speak in behalf of these lads, and was very desirous to make application in their behalf. At his desire it was that I spoke to Mr Baron Vaughan. He knew more of the two Gees than of the others; but he knew them all, being on the Parish to which they belonged. He told me that he was confident that they had been driven away by others; that they were quiet lads, but very poor; that had been of late working for the Parish at 3/- per week at the very outside, and that they deserved the most ... consideration. I enclose to you a note he subsequently sent to me respecting them, with an enclosure.



FURTHER INFORMATION: In 1840 William North was sharing a farm with his brothers-in-law, Robert Blake and John Bowden in the Bothwell district. Around 1845 he became licensee of the *Cape of Good Hope Inn*, near Oatlands. He was still there in 1851 when he bought the 400 acre property of *Grantham*, near Bothwell. It is believed that his father-in-law, Edward Bowden, probably bought the property in June 1842, for on the 30th of that month he

mortgaged it to William Lindsey, a Hobart Town publican, for £1266.5.0. Bowden had not repaid this sum and was in fact also owing interest of £166.5.0 in addition, when Lindsey foreclosed in 1850.

Mr Lindsey lost heavily on the deal, and the place was passed in at the auction and brought privately by William North for £725.0.0, of which he only paid the deposit, £181.5.0, in cash. Presumably he paid the balance over the next five years.

In May 1852 William North sailed for Melbourne with his brother-in-law, John Bowden, to try their luck on the goldfields. They were obviously successful as will be seen from the following letter, written by William to his brother Charles.

£10 (pounds)

My Dear Mother and Brother

I sent you a letter on the 1 of this month with a Draft in it for 10£ and I now send you another in case you do not get the other should you get them both only one is of any use to you it is a sure way of sending money home. Christmas is just over and I hope you all had a merry one and I a happy new year this us now the middle of summer it is very hot and dry the Crops do not look very well I am just going to commence Haymaking besure and write as soon as you get this and tell me plenty of news I suppose there are not many people in the Parish now that I should know I should like very much to see you all once more I shall only write you a short Letter as I am in hopes you will get the other I have sent you five small specimens of gold in the Buff wrough state that we got at the Victoria diggings I have no more to say at present so I must conclude with our kindest love to you all my Wife and children send there love to you and Wife and Mother and all the Family I hope Dear Mother is alive and well give my kindest love to her

A local valuation roll, printed in the *Hobart Town Gazette* of 20 November 1860, shows that, at this time, *Grantham* was assessed at an annual value of £75 and in addition William

North owned ten acres of land, at an annual value of £10, in near by Dennistoun Road.

William North's father-in-law, Edward Bowden, arrived in VDL on board the *Governor Ready*. He had been sentenced to 7 years transportation for stealing fowls. At the time of his trial he was said to be a notorious character. On 4 August 1828 he applied for his wife Dinah and their 5 children to be sent out to join him. In the month of February 1833, the accompanying Memorial and Affidavits were transmitted to the Right Hon: Viscount Melbourne His Majesty's the principal Secretary of State for the Home department who returned the following answer that by a recent Act of Parliament it is provided "that no Convict transported for seven years, shall receive from the Governors of the Australian Colonies, any pardon ticket of Leave or other indulgence until he shall have served four years of labor."

My Brother, John Olden having now been in Van Diemen's Land more than the above period I take the liberty of respectfully submitting the Documents to your notice, and I hope you will consider his case to be one, which you can recommend for remission of the remainder of the term.

For my own character and respectability I beg your Lordship's attention to the names attached to this Memorial.

FURTHER INFORMATION: (Kindly supplied by Mike Pinchin)

On arrival in VDL Joseph Pinchin was assigned to Mr James Radcliffe who held land at Lisdillon, which is on the east coast and overlooks Great Oyster Bay. Life under Radcliffe could not have been easy as he had a reputation of being a hard man, who did not hesitate to punish his assignees, via the local Magistrates. On 18th April 1833 Joseph was charged with 'insolence and disobedience of orders' and was subsequently sentenced to thirty lashes, which was recorded as 'being carried out in the usual manner.' Joseph would have had little, if any, time to recover before he was returned to his assigned work, although he may have been attended by a Doctor Storey, a kindly Quaker who travelled that part of the colony by mule, tending the sick and needy. On the 20th August 1835 Joseph was issued with a Ticket of Leave, which he celebrated by getting drunk. The consequence was that he was arrested and had his Ticket suspended for 14 days, during which time he was employed on Public Works, building a breakwater at Waterloo Point, the present day Swansea. Like most of the other machine breakers, Joseph received his Free Pardon on 3rd February 1836. Sadly nothing more is known about him after that date.

Back in England Joseph's wife, Hannah and their children, like all the families of transportees, were left to pick up the pieces, innocent victims of an unjust system. Tied to their cottages they were left to the mercy of the land owner. Those who found employment did so at low wages and long hours, the children working alongside them in the fields, in all weathers, for a pittance. On October 8th 1840, Hannah Pinchin died from consumption, aged 45 years. Mary Anna, her youngest child, was taken in by the Moon family, until she too died of consumption, two years later, aged 12 years. Her eldest son, James, moved in with the family of his Aunt Sarah, his father's sister, who was married to Richard Davy of Pewsey. There he stayed until 1845 when, at the age of 19, he enlisted in the 45th Regiment of Foot, at Marlborough. From there he went to Devizes Barracks, and then on to the Isle of Wight, joining the Depot Battalion at Parkhurst. In 1846 he was posted to South Africa, joining the 1st Battalion at Fort Napier, Pietermaritzburg, Natal. He was to serve in Africa for eleven and a half years. During the time that James was in South Africa two wars were fought between the British and the local native tribes. These are known respectively as the 7th and 8th Kaffir Wards, which lasted between 1846 and 1853. A medal, The South Africa Medal 1834-53, was awarded to those regiments involved in the wars. Unfortunately the bulk of the returns for the 45th Regiment have been lost due to water damage during storage and there is no way of knowing for certain whether James was ever awarded this medal, but as the regiment was involved in extensive operation during the period James was there it is quite possible that he qualified for the award. On the 19th August 1855, whilst blasting rocks as part of a road making party, a mine explosion seriously injured him. He suffered injury to the eyes which was to impair his vision in later years. In 1856 he returned to England, joining the Regiment Depot at Parkhurst as a Musket instructor, and on the 1st November 1860 he was promoted to Corporal. Whilst at Parkhurst James must have spent at least some of his leave back at his native Pewsey, as on the 22nd November 1860, he married Sarah Louisa Coles, at the parish church of St Peter, Milton Lilborne. Sarah came from New Mill and was

the daughter of Charles and Sarah Coles (née Wiltshire). James and Sarah returned to the Isle of White and moved in to married quarters at Parkhurst, where their first child, Joseph Charles, was born in 1865. On the 20th August 1866, James attended an Army Medical Board at Chatham, where he was found unfit for Military Service, due to blindness in the right eye and only partial sight in the other. He was finally discharged on 18th September 1866, after serving 21 years 26 days, thus qualifying for the Army Long Service and Good Conduct Medal, and a pension of £9.6s.6d per year. James and his family returned to Wiltshire and set up home at Milton Lilborne, and it was here that the rest of the children were born; Arthur 1868, Walter George 1870, Mary 1872, William, 1874, and Eliza in 1877. Like most of the families in the area they worked on the land for long hours and low wages. With James' pension they should have been better off than most, but as James was almost blind, they had to rely on Sarah and the older children to earn wages to augment the pension money. The 1871 census shows James as a Pensioner, and Sarah and Joseph as Agricultural Labourers. James died on 13th August 1878. at the age of 54 years, and was buried at Milton Lilborne. Sarah struggled on bringing her children up, taking in one of her brothers, Frederick Coles, as a lodger, as shown in the 1881 census. The census return of 1891 shows only William and Eliza still living with her. Her eldest son, Joseph, was married to Mary Gale, and living with his young family at Lower House Farm Cottages, East Everly. Walter lived in an adjoining cottage with a Charles Gale, working as an under carter. On 7th July 1900, whilst visiting her son, Joseph, Sarah died from a cerebral haemorrhage. She was buried alongside her husband at the parish church of St Peter, Milton Lilborne.

Manningford Tuesday Jany 11th 1831

Dear Sir,

As you have so kindly undertaken in consequence of our conference yesterday to advocate the cause of Isaac Roberts now under sentence of Transportation for 7 years in consequence of being with a mob at the Clifts of Woodbro, and where certainly the conduct of many justly deserves some punishment and have already mentioned his case to Mr Justice Park who was pleased to say he would take it into consideration, I think it proper to give you a few particulars respecting the poor fellow which if you approve, I shall feel greatly obliged by your transmitting to his Lordship as soon as possible. He will thus be fully acquainted with what has occurred, and will then I trust consider that I have some grounds for the application which I have made in his behalf. Isaac Roberts was born in this Parish, and is now ab^t 23 years of age, I have known him from a Child, he has been the greater part of the time in my service as labourer and I can most conscientiously say that 'till the unfortunate transaction happened to which I have made allusion I have never had occasion to find any fault with him, neither have I heard from any other quarter that he has been deserving of censure – On the contrary his case exerts general commiseration through our Village and many an anxious enquiry has been made this morning respecting the results of my Journey yesterday – On one occasion he was in the service of a Farmer near this place almost a twelve month, and I have ascertained that with him his conduct was perfectly satisfactory, and he has now been apprenticed to a Shoemaker nearly a year and a half, and during that period I hear from his Master, who has appeared to feel very much for him ever since his commitment that he has been perfectly sober and in every respect behaved well.

From the moment I heard of the circumstances which led to his apprehension I determined to do what I could for him in the event of his commitment for trial; and should most assuredly have been in Court at the time, but hearing that his case had been taken in hand by a Magistrate residing in the same Village with his present master (but who was absent at

the very time when he might probably have been of service) I unhappily remained at home. This magistrate, Sir E Poore undertook to appear for him but was absent at the very time when he might probably have been of service - Ther is circumstance more, and a very peculiar one which I wish to mention - he is a twin, and so exactly resembles his Brother that his Father has told me he has sometimes been at a loss to distinguish one son from the other, now they were both certainly at Woodbro, but I firmly believe and so do many others that his Brother was the Person who assisted in destroying the Threshing Machine, that he did nothing, and that the Witness by whom he was convicted mistook one for the other - This might readily be the case after what I have stated - His Brother escaped detection, but I believe what has taken place will be a useful lesson to him for he appears to feel most deeply for Isaac I would also state that when he left me five Pounds were given as a testimonial of my good opinion of him. I believe you know that he was in a Blacksmith's Shop at the time the Mob came, the master of which has said that he was quite compelled to join the multitude, and that their threat was the cause of it - I have now done and feel sorry to occasion you this trouble, but from the kind manner in which you received me yesterday, I am quite sure you will not regard it - I would have applied to Mr Justice Park direct, but being a perfect stranger to his Lordship, I am convinced my cause is in better hands when I leave it with you

That your Petitions are of opinion that he took no part in any Riot, was not armed in any way, but was mistaken by the <u>only Witness</u> against him for <u>a twin Brother</u> who was ... to have carried an offensive weapon, and whom he so exactly resembles, that even their Father has frequently mistaken one for the other. That your Petitioner have clearly ascertained that the said Isaac Roberts was compelled by threats to join the mob, and can also safely assert that he has borne an unexceptional Character in the Villages of Manningford Bruce and Rushall where he has always resided.

That your Petitioners are of opinion that but for the <u>accidental</u> absence of a gentleman who had undertaken to speak in his favor the said Isaac Roberts would either have been liberated, or only a slight punishment awarded.

My Dear Sir,

I have carefully read the papers you have sent to me relating to the case of <u>Isaac Roberts</u> and have examined my notes of the Evidence taken upon his trial. He was tried upon two separate Indictments arising out of the same transaction. The one charging him with the <u>Capital</u> offence of Robbery from the Person of the Prosecutor John Clift of Woodborough in the County of Wilts, the other for breaking the Thrashing Machine of the same Prosecutor.

He was acquitted upon the first Indictment because although sworn to be one of the Mob which demanded the money he was not proved to have taken any active part in the Robbery and might have been at such a distance from the more advanced as not to have knowingly participated in; or actively demanded the act.

Upon the second Indictment for breaking the Machine he was convicted, his Person being identified by a Witness of the name of John Martin who swore positively to seeing him in the act of breaking the Machine and I have no reason to doubt the truth of his testimony.

Whether he is under all the circumstances a fit subject to receive an extension of the Royal Mercy is a ... which I submit to the consideration of those whose province it is to assist his Majesty with their advice on this occasion.

The Friends of Thomas Smith, William Midwinter, and William Rodbourne, all of this Parish, now confined in the County Gaol of Devizes, under sentence of Imprisonment for one year for rioting and breaking machinery in November last, have earnestly requested me to join with them in an

humble petition to his Majesty's Government, that the above mentioned prisoners may be immediately liberated, on the grounds that James Moulden of this Parish also, sentenced at the same time, for the same offence, and for the same length of confinement, has already been set at liberty.

With great reluctance generally to interfere in the case of persons, whose improper conduct has rendered them answerable to the Laws, yet a sense of Justice compels me in the present instance to say, that I can see no possible reason for the distinction in the above cases: and therefore as mercy has been extended to one Prisoner I feel myself bound to join in the petition that the same lenity may be extended to the three others: They have already been confined for more than half the time to which they were sentenced, and their former Employers speak favourably of their Characters, previously to their conduct on the late occasion.

2. My Lord,

I have to acknowledge the favor of a Letter, written by your Lordship's command, in answer to an application which I had taken the liberty of making in behalf of Thomas Smith, William Midwinter, and William Rodbourne, now confined in Devizes gaol, praying that it might be taken into consideration whether the same lenity might not be shown in regard to those three prisoners as had previously been shown to James Moulden, who had been tried for the same offence, & had received the same sentence. Your Lordship was pleased to express a desire, previous to taking the case into consideration; that the sentiments of the magistrate who committed the Prisoners together with a more explicit report of

the previous character of these persons might be obtained, accordingly, I enclose a letter written to me upon the subject by Lieut Col Vilett, who committed these men, and also statements respecting their previous character from those by whom they were last employed.

At this season of the year in the midst of Harvest, there can be no doubt of immediate labour being found for the men, should his Majesty's Government think fit to release them.

I beg to express my sincere thanks for the obliging manner in which your Lordship has replied to my application, which was dictated purely by a feeling, that cases as far as I can discover, in all respects similar, should upon principles of equal justice be treated alike.

Submitting the case however entirely to the consideration, & for better Judgement of your Lordships, I have the

This is to certify that William Rodbourne of Highworth live with me as a servant for the space of nearly two years. That he left my service of his own accord in order to gain a better situation which he subsequently left without being able to procure another, and I believe also that from this want of employment he was induced to join the society of older and more depressed company through whose influence and example he was induced to the commission of the offence for which he has suffered imprisonment for nearly eight months.

We the undersigned inhabitants of Highworth beg to represent that so far as regards the above named William

Rodbourne we have never heard anything alleged against him as respects his Honesty, Sobriety, and general orderly and peaceable demeanor, until the unfortunate occurrences of last November when he with some others, older than himself, and who have since been liberated, were found guilty of riotously assembling etc and sentenced to 12 months imprisonment in the Gaol of Devizes. That as has been observed other individuals have been set at liberty, who were implicated in the same offence, and who were older than himself - considering also that he was inveigled perhaps by the evil example of those very individuals, we beg to recommend the said William Rodbourne as a fit object for his Majesty's clemency, more particularly when it is remembered that that period of the year is now near at hand when the labourer in the field can make the best market of his exertions, and that if the said prisoner remain in prison till November, immediately on his liberation he will have to encounter a complete dearth of employment, and that he will be thrown on the parish or on his Father for support, who has now a larger family than he can well provide for without parochial assistance.

I am just returned from Winchester and am sorry to say I was too late to see you.

With regard to these four men, viz Moulden, Rodbourne, Midwinter, & Smith, finding that at the request of Mr James Crowdy one of them, viz Moulden, had been liberated, I forwarded the Petition of the friends of the other three to Lord Melbourne taking the liberty of recommending it earnestly to his Lordship's notice. The principle on which I proceeded was, that as the four men had been found quilty of the same offence, & had received the same sentence, it seem hard that one should be enjoying his liberty five months before the others, especially as they were all spoken equally well of by their former employers. From all I can learn there is no difference whatever in their previous characters; & in the present scrape they were all similarly involved. Col. Vilett, who committed them agreed with me in this view of the case, and allowed me to enclose his opinion in the packet to Lord M.

As they are not liberated, I conclude that now they have requested the more powerful assistance of Lord Radnor. His Lordship will of course act according to his own very good judgement in such matters. All I can say is that upon a principal of equal justice, it seemed to me that as the case of all was the same, & their character the same, they all ought to meet the same fate. It is the first time I ever interfered for prisoners after sentence, and should not have done so now, if a successful interference for one of the parties had not been excited.

I have looked at my note of the case of Midwinter & Rodbourne. According to it Smith was acquitted – a man of the name of Selwood was however convicted with the two

former, but he was imprisoned only for 6 months & his period is expired.

The other two were imprisoned for 12 months. There was nothing peculiar in their case. It was an ordinary case of breaking a thrashing machine unaccompanied by any circumstances of violence to person or to the other property of the prosecutor. No distinction whatever exists between their cases. If either receives any mitigation of their sentence both ought to receive it. <u>Selwood</u> had a very good char^t. The others had a fair one – but not so good as his.

But I really think on the whole that they were leniently dealt with & that under existing circumstances & considering the state of the western counties it will not be expedient to mitigate the sentence. However, the case is for Lord Melbourne's better Judg^t. There is nothing in the report which will at all assist you but if you wish it my clerk shall copy my note (which is a very short one) of the ...

PERMISSION TO MARRY: Aaron Shepard (as Shepherd) was granted permission to marry Elizabeth Adam, convict per *Mary*, in December 1841. (AOTAS CON52/2 p182)

Elizabeth Adam was sentenced at Perth, Scotland, to 7 years transportation in April and arrived in Van Diemen's Land per Mary in October 1823. She arrived in VDL before Lieutenant Governor Arthur did and therefore before Arthur had reformed the convict system and instituted proper record keeping. No description list for her has yet been located. Elizabeth Adam's conduct record (AO TAS CON 40/1) was, at least partly, compiled from unknown earlier documents and some recorded punishments appear out of chronological order on it. It is evident that she received at least three and possibly four colonial sentences and/or extensions, was free by servitude for a few months only at the end of 1834 and beginning of 1835 and was back in servitude from early 1835 until sometime after she received permission to marry Aaron Shepherd. During her first term of transportation and its associated extensions she received (at least) one reprimand and ten punishments for crimes misdemeanours ranging from absconding disobedience of orders to stealing and making use of abominable and threatening language and striking her mistress.

We whose names are hereunder written humbly crave leave to draw your Lordship's attention to the cases of John Shergold and George Shergold late of the parish of Stapleford in the County of Wilts Farmers Labourers who at the Special Assizes holden for the County of Wilts in the Month of December 1830 were convicted of having by threats and menaces robbed Christopher Ingram Esquire of the said parish of Stapleford of Five Shillings his money and were then and there sentenced by the Court to be transported beyond the Seas for the term of their natural lives. We beg to state to your Lordship that the cases of the above named Prisoners were similar to others which at the time of the ever to be remembered riotous and tumultuous proceedings that raged in this and many other Counties in this Kingdom in the latter part of the year 1830 and which tumults we are firmly

of opinion were incited by some dastardly and disaffected person whose object and aim were to subject the Laws and overthrow our blessed Constitution. And it is lamentable to observe that in most every Case the ignorant and unwary were the sole victims of the base and dastardly designs of the persons before alluded to, whilst they escaped undetected and consequently unpunished.

We cannot but express our admiration and approbation of the prompt and well advised measures of His Majesty's Government at the period alluded to as we feel assured but for those measures this envied Country would at this time be in a state of Anarchy and revolution.

Of the before mentioned prisoners we beg further to state to your Lordship that we knew them for many years, they were honest, hardworking industrious and useful Labourers peaceable in their demeanour and in all other respects bore excellent characters and were sons of honest and industrious parents whom we know and can testify as to the poignant sorrows they have felt and still feel at the unhappy (though we admit just) fate of their children. That the crime they committed was previously fore thought or contemplated we do not believe, but that it was committed in a moment of excitement as then existed in the Country and by the instigation of others we have every reason to believe. With these feeling therefore and the feelings we entertain for the deep grief of the parents of the unfortunate prisoners it is that we now venture to approach your Lordship with an humble but fervent hope that your Lordship will submit the case of the unfortunate men to our beloved and most Gracious Monarch as the fountain of all Mercy whom we doubt not in the exercise of his Royal Prerogative and abundant Charity may graciously be pleased to mitigate the now period of sentence for life of the Prisoners to some shorter period. And for this it is we humbly ask and pray for. We further beg to add that we have every reason to believe that the Prosecutor of the Prisoners would have heartily joined in this our recommendation and prayer but he is unfortunately since dead.

I have been requested by the father and mother of the convicts to whom the accompanying Petition refers, to lay the same before your Lordship in the hope that some alteration of the punishment awarded to their sons, may if possible be granted. I have known the father and mother for many years, I may say all my Life; and I was principally instrumental in the conviction of their sons; and am the nearest magistrate to the village in which they all lived. The father and mother are in circumstances of great poverty, but have always borne the character of honest and industrious people; the sons were not I believe either of them previously to Nov 1830, when the Riots amongst the population prevailed, ever accused of any offence or misconduct.

I have looked, my Lord, at the signatures to the petition with the handwriting of many of the Inscribers I am well acquainted, and I believe that the several names were written by the persons whose names are subscribed, who are principally the farmers and yeomen of the neighbourhood.

If your Lordship should think that any alleviation of punishment, or any hope of alleviation can consistently with justice be held out, perhaps your Lordship would permit me to communicate the hope to the petitioners.



To The Right Honourable the Secretary of State My Lord,

I take the liberty of addressing you on a subject which I fear has of late occupied much of your precious time, but the consideration that I am acting solely in the cause of my poor & unfortunate fellow creatures as also Parishioners will I trust be deemed by your Lordship an apology for the intrusion.

During the late Riots which unhappily prevailed in this County, William Lewis, Henry Shergold & James Down with five others were found guilty of breaking machinery in this Town & sentenced to transportation for life, the wives of the above named three, the only married persons, suffering perhaps more than the convicts themselves, from the loss of their Husbands support acknowledging them kind & affectionate Parents, are anxious if possible to join them. To this purpose I interest myself in their behalf, & anxiously wait your Lordship's opinion whether Government would sanction such a proceeding, further whether Government would give any assistance for the prosecution of this charitable act.

I should inform your Lordship that a part of the Reward given for the apprehension of the offenders was allotted to these unfortunate women, who are most willing to give their portion for the furtherance of this their desired object, & I think I may venture to say the Parish will also contribute, for the purpose of carrying it into effect.

Should mitigation be desirable to the Colony whither the Convicts are sent (to us unknown) the following statement would perhaps be some little inducement to accede to the earnest request of these suffering, tho' not less deserving females.

Elizabeth wife of William Lewis aged 31 years, four children, 3 girls & 1 boy the eldest 7 y^{rs} the youngest 8 months.

Fanny wife of Henry Shergold aged 31 years, 5 children, 4 girls & 1 boy the eldest 10 y^{rs} the youngest 6 months.

Harriet wife of James Down aged 26 years just on the point of being confined with her first child.

Having laid these particulars before you, I must again apologise for trespassing and subscribe myself

To the Right Honourable Lord Viscount Melbourne His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department etc etc etc My Lord

We whose names are hereunder written humbly crave leave to draw your Lordship's attention to the cases of John Shergold and George Shergold late of the parish of Stapleford in the County of Wilts Farmers Labourers who at the Special Assizes holden for the County of Wilts in the Month of December 1830 were convicted of having by threats and menaces robbed Christopher Ingram Esquire of the said parish of Stapleford of Five Shillings his money and were then and there sentenced by the Court to be transported beyond the Seas for the term of their natural lives. We beg to state to your Lordship that the cases of the above named Prisoners were similar to others which at the time of the ever to be remembered riotous and tumultuous proceedings that raged in this and many other Counties in this Kingdom in the latter part of the year 1830 and which tumults we are firmly of opinion were incited by some dastardly and disaffected person whose object and aim were to subject the Laws and overthrow our blessed Constitution. And it is lamentable to observe that in most every Case the ignorant and unwary were the sole victims of the base and dastardly designs of the persons before alluded to, whilst they escaped undetected and consequently unpunished.

We cannot but express our admiration and approbation of the prompt and well advised measures of His Majesty's Government at the period alluded to as we feel assured but for those measures this envied Country would at this time be in a state of Anarchy and revolution.

Of the before mentioned prisoners we beg further to state to your Lordship that we knew them for many years, they were honest, hardworking industrious and useful Labourers peaceable in their demeanour and in all other respects bore excellent characters and were sons of honest and industrious parents whom we know and can testify as to the poignant sorrows they have felt and still feel at the unhappy (though we admit just) fate of their children. That the crime they committed was previously fore thought or contemplated we do not believe, but that it was committed in a moment of excitement as then existed in the Country and by the instigation of others we have every reason to believe. With these feeling therefore and the feelings we entertain for the deep grief of the parents of the unfortunate prisoners it is that we now venture to approach your Lordship with an humble but fervent hope that your Lordship will submit the case of the unfortunate men to our beloved and most Gracious Monarch as the fountain of all Mercy whom we doubt not in the exercise of his Royal Prerogative and abundant Charity may graciously be pleased to mitigate the now period of sentence for life of the Prisoners to some shorter period. And for this it is we humbly ask and pray for. We further beg to add that we have every reason to believe that the Prosecutor of the Prisoners would have heartily joined in this our recommendation and prayer but he is unfortunately since dead.

My Lord,

I have been requested by the father and mother of the convicts to whom the accompanying Petition refers, to lay the same before your Lordship in the hope that some alteration of the punishment awarded to their sons, may if possible be granted. I have known the father and mother for many years, I may say all my Life; and I was principally instrumental in the conviction of their sons; and am the nearest magistrate to the village in which they all lived. The father and mother are in circumstances of great poverty, but have always borne the character of honest and industrious people; the sons were not I believe either of them previously to Nov 1830, when the Riots amongst the population prevailed, ever accused of any offence or misconduct.

I have looked, my Lord, at the signatures to the petition with the handwriting of many of the Inscribers I am well acquainted, and I believe that the several names were written by the persons whose names are subscribed, who are principally the farmers and yeomen of the neighbourhood.

If your Lordship should think that any alleviation of punishment, or any hope of alleviation can consistently with justice be held out, perhaps your Lordship would permit me to communicate the hope to the petitioners.

The Friends of Thomas Smith, William Midwinter, and William Rodbourne, all of this Parish, now confined in the County Gaol of Devizes, under sentence of Imprisonment for one year for rioting and breaking machinery in November last, have earnestly requested me to join with them in an humble petition to his Majesty's Government, that the above mentioned prisoners may be immediately liberated, on the

grounds that James Moulden of this Parish also, sentenced at the same time, for the same offence, and for the same length of confinement, has already been set at liberty.

I have to acknowledge the favor of a Letter, written by your Lordship's command, in answer to an application which I had taken the liberty of making in behalf of Thomas Smith, William Midwinter, and William Rodbourne, now confined in Devizes gaol, praying that it might be taken into consideration whether the same lenity might not be shown in regard to those three prisoners as had previously been shown to James Moulden, who had been tried for the same offence, & had received the same sentence. Your Lordship was pleased to express a desire, previous to taking the case into consideration; that the sentiments of the magistrate who committed the Prisoners together with a more explicit report of the previous character of these persons might be obtained, accordingly, I enclose a letter written to me upon the subject

by Lieut Col Vilett, who committed these men, and also statements respecting their previous character from those by whom they were last employed.

At this season of the year in the midst of Harvest, there can be no doubt of immediate labour being found for the men, should his Majesty's Government think fit to release them.

I beg to express my sincere thanks for the obliging manner in which your Lordship has replied to my application, which was dictated purely by a feeling, that cases as far as far as I can discover, in all respects similar, should upon principles of equal justice be treated alike.

I am just returned from Winchester and am sorry to say I was too late to see you.

With regard to these four men, viz Moulden, Rodbourne, Midwinter, & Smith, finding that at the request of Mr James Crowdy one of them, viz Moulden, had been liberated, I forwarded the Petition of the friends of the other three to Lord Melbourne taking the liberty of recommending it earnestly to his Lordship's notice. The principle on which I proceeded was, that as the four men had been found quilty of the same offence, & had received the same sentence, it seem hard that one should be enjoying his liberty five months before the others, especially as they were all spoken equally well of by their former employers. From all I can learn there is no difference whatever in their previous characters; & in the present scrape they were all similarly involved. Col. Vilett, who committed them agreed with me in this view of the case, and allowed me to enclose his opinion in the packet to Lord M.

As they are not liberated, I conclude that now they have requested the more powerful assistance of Lord Radnor. His Lordship will of course act according to his own very good judgement in such matters. All I can say is that upon a principal of equal justice, it seemed to me that as the case of all was the same, & their character the same, they all ought to meet the same fate. It is the first time I ever interfered for prisoners after sentence, and should not have done so now, if a successful interference for one of the parties had not been excited.

9. Dear Phillipps,

I have looked at my note of the case of Midwinter & Rodbourne. <u>According to it Smith was acquitted</u> – a man of the name of Selwood was however convicted with the two former, but he was imprisoned only for 6 months & his period is expired.

The other two were imprisoned for 12 months. There was nothing peculiar in their case. It was an ordinary case of breaking a thrashing machine unaccompanied by any circumstances of violence to person or to the other property of the prosecutor. No distinction whatever exists between their cases. If either receives any mitigation of their sentence both ought to receive it. <u>Selwood</u> had a very good char^{*}. The others had a fair one – but not so good as his.

But I really think on the whole that they were leniently dealt with & that under existing circumstances & considering the state of the western counties it will not be expedient to mitigate the sentence. However, the case is for Lord

Melbourne's better Judg^t. There is nothing in the report which will at all assist you but if you wish it my clerk shall copy my note (which is a very short one) of the ...

They are particularly desirous of knowing whether such certificate has reached this County, and whether His Majesty's Secretary of State for the Home Department, would be graciously pleased to grant an allowance in lieu of a free passage to the wife and child of Laban Stone, in order that they may embrace a most eligible offer of a passage to NSW, in a vessel which is freighted from London by the merchant in whose service the convict is now living; and in which the convicts brother is now proceeding to the colony as a settler on the terms of servitude after arrival.

The conditional promise of a free passage was in recommendation of the convicts wife, by a Wiltshire Magistrate, actively engaged in quelling the agricultural riots; and several letters from the convict, and strong testimonials from Mr Montifiore his master, were submitted to inspection at the Home Department, by the same benevolent Gentleman, Mr Scott, in support of his application.

INFORMATION ON FAMILY IN ENGLAND

(The following information on Laban Stone's family kindly supplied by Catherine Burden)

By the 1851 census both Sarah Stones were living together in Uphill, Urchfont, Sarah the Mother being identified as the head of the household and described as a widow. She was an Ag Lab, aged 43 and born in Patney, Wiltshire. Her daughter was aged 15 and born in Urchfont.

On 18th October 1858 Sarah, the daughter, married Jonathan Clements in Urchfont. It appears from later censuses that Sarah, the mother, lived with them and their family until her death possibly in the March quarter of 1896 at the age of 88.

I have found Jonathan and Sarah Clements had 2 children, Elizabeth and George. By 1881 Elizabeth has moved away but her 2 year old daughter, Edith Lucy Clements was living with her parents, brother and grandmother.

Thanks to an article by Richard Bridgland entitled "LED TO STRAY BY THE CHURCH", in the Wiltshire Family History Society journal I was able to find what became of John, the son of Laban Stone. The article explained how Richard Bridgland had found his missing Urchfont forebear, James Gidding, in Stoke Climsland, Cornwall in the 1851 census. It appears that James Gidding moved there with the Reverend William Henry Spencer and family when they left Urchfont. A number of other parishioners also moved there with them. The Urchfont strays included

James Burden

Charles Harris, his wife Elizabeth and children Charles, Mary J, Emma, Maria, and Sarah A

James Giddens and his sister Emma, and John Stone.

John Stone was described as a 20 year old Ag Lab born in Wiltshire Erchfont.

The article explained that by the 1861 census James Gidding had returned to Devizes but the others, with the exception of Emma Giddings who had disappeared, were still living in Cornwall. John Stone was married to Elizabeth and was a Police Constable!

I believe that this John Stone was Laban and Sarah's son and married Emma Giddings in the March quarter on 1856 in the Launceston area. The birth of a Laban Stone is registered in the same district in the March quarter of 1855 and the death of a Laban Stone in the June quarter of the same year. The death of an Emma Stone is registered in Launceston a year after Laban died.

John Stone appears to have married Elizabeth Mary Strike in the September quarter of 1857. By the 1861 census they were living in North Petherwin, Devon. John was a Police Constable in the County Constabulary. Living with them were their 3 daughters, Thirza, Sarah Maria and Mary.

By the 1871 census the family had moved to Coombe in Teignhead, Devon. John was still a Police Constable. The family had been enlarged by sons Laban, William Ed, Frank, Tom and daughter Emma. Emma aged 6 was born in Clompton, Devon. Their daughter Thirza was in service in Coombe in Teinghead.

I have not been able to find John Stone in the 1881 census however his wife Elizabeth M Stone is described as a widow and Laban, Frank and Thom were still living with her, together with a 5 year old boarder called Ellen Stiggins who had been born in Abbotskerswell, Devon.

A Note on William Taylor (Kindly supplied by Professor G B Sharman)

On arrival per Proteus William Taylor was assigned to the Loan Gang, a group of convict artisans who were loaned for short periods to colonial establishments and settlers. Where he was initially sent is uncertain but he may have been loaned to James Simpson, a Ross magistrate, who later became one of the first and most important settlers in the then newly founded Port Phillip colony; the future Australian State of Victoria. Taylor was later loaned to (amongst others) D. McLeod, 14 Sep. - 28 Nov. 1832; F. E. D. Browne, 07 Dec. 1832 - 01 Mar. 1833; Samuel Bryan, 15 Mar. - early Aug. 1833; Captain G. King, 6 months, from 19 Aug. 1833; G. Hobler, 6 months, from 17 Oct. 1833; George Robson, 6 months from 23 Apr. 1834; William Wood, 6 months from the 25 Nov. 1834 and S. Lord, 6 months from 28 Aug. 1835. He received a ticket-of leave on 01 Oct. 1835 after which his movements are uncertain not least because there were about eighty men named William Taylor transported to Van Diemen's Land. It is unlikely that he was the William Taylor who went to Port Phillip on the Norval looking after sheep as he was a sawyer, rather than an agricultural labourer or shepherd.

Dear Lamb,

I am encouraged by your letter received this evening to report to you an application, which I made to Mr Baron Vaughan at Salisbury in behalf of 4 lads who were capitally convicted at the last Special Assize for Robbery.

Their names are Jeremiah New - John Thorne - David Gee, and Worthy Gee. They were included in an Indictment with a man of the name of Watts. This last was a stout man of, I suppose, 28 or 29 years of age: the other four were lads. I was present at the trial: the evidence was conclusive against them all; but there were no aggravating circumstances. The Jury found them all Guilty, but recommended the four lads to mercy. One of the Gee's called on Spicer to his character; but he did not answer. On a subsequent day I saw Spicer, who turned out to be a man, whom I have known some years ago, a very respectable yeoman; I ..., I think, to theability of that class. He then told me that he very much regretted that he had not been present to speak in behalf of these lads, and was very desirous to make application in their behalf. At his desire it was that I spoke to Mr Baron Vaughan. He knew more of the two Gees than of the others; but he knew them all, being of the Parish to which they belonged. He told me that he was confident that they had been driven away by others; that they were quiet lads, but very poor; that had been of late working for the Parish at 3/- per week at the very outside, and that they deserved the consideration. I enclose to you a note he subsequently sent to me respecting them, with an enclosure.

I commend their case to Lord Melbourne's kind consideration. I am





My Lord

This man was convicted at the special commission for the County of Wilts of robbing me of half a Sovereign, the robbery was not personal but he came with a mob to a farm house of mine in Wilts and obtained from my Bailiff half a Sovereign. The magistrates directed him to be prosecuted. I have minutely enquired into this mans general conduct and character, it seems that he is a thresher at Vernham Dean County of Hants on the border of Wiltshire, had a wife and six children, he was not violent, and prevented mischief since he entreated the mob to avoid going into the Rickyard, and tho' another farmer was asked for money, and he was an opulent man, he contented this mob by payment of one

shilling. I observe this man is now under sentence of transportation in the York Hulk at Gosport. The Clergyman of the Parish has written to me much in his favour, and if your Lordship could think it your duty to recommend him to His Majesty's clemency, I think it would have no evil but a beneficial effect on the minds of the Peasantry in that part of the Country, where until these late deplorable disorders Job Waldron was considered by all an excellent character. 




49. Headstone in memory of Margaret, wife of Thomas Whatley



Sir I am sorry that I should offend you on this Occasion but I hope your honour will be favourable to me as it is the first offence

And being forced possible to leave my work being pulled out of shop by 2 persons by the name of Samuel Ares/Arcs & Thomas hayter early on Thursday morning as the rioting begun by which I said I was busy & would not go went to my work as usal for the space of an hour or more till the mob returned as I was going to breakfast Rice Chivrel entered with a (way?) sledge in his hand & said come thee must go with us which I answered I was busy & would not go & he pushed me to the door where there stood william snook of ansty water with a large ash bludgon in his hand & said go on or else I will make thee I went into shop & said I wouldn't

go for I was going to shoe the doctors horse by which several went out of shop And Charles Gerred their Captain as he called himself said is not he coming by which the mob answered he is going to shoe to doctors horse) which Answer Charles Gerred said damnation sease the doctors horse make him come Or else beat the bugers damnation brains out by which several entered the shop & pushed me for the space of 10 lugs & said that if I offered not to go back be damd if they would not kill me I am sir your obedient and humble Servant

I tried to save this Man from transportation but without effect. He was a young Blacksmith of good previous character but did much mischief.

The following extract can be found in *Hunter's River* (NSW) by Cecily J Mitchell (1984 edition) The original letter is in the Dinton - Dalwood Letters p42, Mitchell Library, Sydney.

When our last letters to you were written the whole country was in an uproar, as well as two or three of the adjoining ones. William and his yeomen certainly stopped the rioters from going into Somersetshire; no riots have taken place there

yet, and I trust the whole kingdom will soon be guiet again. The Special Assizes took place at Salisbury last week, before three Judges, and a great many prisoners are sentenced to transportation. Two are to be hanged, I hear, one of them for having very nearly killed Mr Oliver Codrington with a sledge hammer in one of the rows in North Wiltshire; the prisoner was not content with knocking him off his horse, but struck him when on the ground and it was some hours before Mr Oliver C. could be brought to life, and he remained insensible for two or three days. He is now pretty well recovered, and is extremely annoyed to find that the Judges of the Capital have sentenced the man to death, as he would not allow the surgeon who attended him to be examined in Court, fearing that such would be the case, and I hear he has desired the counsel to find a flaw, if possible, by which he may escape. The other case is for extorting money.

I think these convicts will be most valuable servants to you and other settlers in New South Wales, I fancy they will not be inclined to quarrel with the machines they will find there. Government has very wisely determined not to send the poor men to the hulks, previous to leaving England, to be made more wicked, but a vessel is now lying off Portsmouth to take them to Botany Bay as soon as possible. No doubt you remember a notorious poacher and evil-disposed person of the name of Jack Ford, alias Henwood, belonging to the parish of Upper Tefont, who always wired all the hares and pheasants in Twickthorn and the adjoining copses. He joined a part near Wilton, assisted in breaking machines, and doing other violence there. At Barford he headed a mob, and broke Mr Nicholson's mill, and then went on to Ono Shipman's house, and declared he would have gold or blood, so Ono gave him a sovereign. These last two offences have transported him for life, much to the joy of William Barnes and Jim Viney. Papa has done his utmost to get one of the men's sentences mitigated, but has not succeeded. He is a native of Chicksgrove or Tisbury, and is a blacksmith. He has always been reckoned the most quiet, industrious young man in the parish. He was absolutely collared and taken out of his father's house by violence; but, of course, when his spirit was up he was active enough, and being a blacksmith he well knew how to break the plows and rollers. Now don't laugh at me very much for what follows, because I know that there is hardly a chance of your ever seeing poor Edmund White, but if you do, don't forget that Papa has interested himself in his behalf. He has seven years to spend at Botany Bay.





55. Letter to Mary Withers from the Home Department

(AOTAS – Withers Letters)

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION: The following extract can be found in *Hunter's River (NSW)* by Cecily J Mitchell (1984 edition) The original letter is in the Dinton - Dalwood Letters p42, Mitchell Library, Sydney.

When our last letters to you were written the whole country was in an uproar, as well as two or three of the adjoining ones. William and his yeomen certainly stopped the rioters from going into Somersetshire; no riots have taken place there yet, and I trust the whole kingdom will soon be quiet again. The Special Assizes took place at Salisbury last week, before three Judges, and a great many prisoners are sentenced to transportation. Two are to be hanged, I hear, one of them for having very nearly killed Mr Oliver Codrington with a sledge hammer in one of the rows in North Wiltshire; the prisoner was not content with knocking him off his horse, but struck him when on the ground and it was some hours before Mr Oliver C. could be brought to life, and he remained insensible for two or three days. He is now pretty well recovered, and is extremely annoyed to find that the Judges of the Capital have sentenced the man to death, as he would not allow the surgeon who attended him to be examined in Court, fearing that such would be the case, and I hear he has desired the counsel to find a flaw, if possible, by which he may escape. *The other case is for extorting money.*

MISCELLANEOUS RIOTERS

The majority of the Wiltshire Machine Breakers and Rioters were tried before the Special Commission in Salisbury, which opened on Monday, 27th December 1831. There were, however a number of arson attacks between late 1829 and early 1830, which were tried at the Assize, and others that occurred after the Special Commission had completed their work. There were also those tried for sending threatening letters, and those who are mentioned as having taken part in the rioting, but were never brought to trial. The information that follows is about these men.

ALTERNATIVE SPELLING: STINGMORE; STINGEMORE; STINGYMORE; STRANGEMAN

In his account of *The Battle of Pythouse*, William Turner describes Thomas Stingemore's part in the affray.

'Thomas Stingemore of Tisbury, (a veritable Trojan) fought desperately against five of his enemy – (like Shaw the Lifeguardsman at Waterloo) – and was severely wounded – and under the direction of the learned judge who tried him he was acquitted – his wounds and constant suffering saving him from a life sentence beyond the seas.'

Turner speaks of Thomas Stingemore as having been acquitted, but I have found no evidence of him having been tried.

I am grateful to Sandra Naish for the following information on her ancestor Thomas Stingemore.

Thomas, son of Thomas & Jane Strangeman was born c1782 at Alvediston.

Zion Hill Chapel of 'Church Members' Register' (Wiltshire & Swindon Archives ref: -1805/8) November 1843 state that Betty Stingemore was admitted 7th February 1845 as a church member readmission; that she died October 31st and was buried at Zion Hill 4th November 1845. The church accounts show that she paid throughout 1845 but the

Chapel records generally were very sparse. The Congregational Chapel burials register (of sorts) records that "the remains of Thomas Stingimore were interred by me, J. Metcalfe White" on Thursday, April 26th 1855. The remains of Mrs Stingemore age 70 years of Tisbury Green were interred on Tuesday, November 4th 1845. The remains of Jane Stangimore of Fontmell, Dorset who died 12th August 1855 aged 39 years were also interred in the chapel burial ground, according to the burial register. Zion Hill Congregational Chapel was only built in 1842 and registered for marriages in 1843 (source Wiltshire Victoria County History: Volume 13)

Also Thomas Stingemore, husband of the above, died April 20th, 1855 aged 73 years.

Also of Jane their daughter died August 12, 1855, aged 38 years.

ALFORD Samuel, of Withyslade Farm

According to William Turner, in his account of the Battle of Pythouse, (see *Wiltshire Machine Breakers Volume I: The Riots & Trial*), the rioters were led by a farmer on a white horse, who he names as Mr Joseph Alford of Withyslade. Turner goes on to describe Mr Alford as 'a considerable holder under Lord Arundell'. There seems little doubt that a Mr Alford of Withyslade was involved in the riots in the Tisbury area as a warrant was put out for him and a description was posted by Lieutenant Colonel Mair, but Mair names the farmer as Richard Alford, and gives the following description of him, dated 30th November 1830. (TNA – HO40/27 f376)

Description of Richard Alford Farmer, and tenant of the Earl of Arundell. He occupied at Tisbury in the County of Wilts a farm called Withersley, is about fifty years of age, about five feet nine inches in height, full faced, round nose, stout, and weighs about sixteen stone, hair

rather grey, waddles in his gait, and turns his toes very much.

The above man rents from Lord Arundell about 200£ a year, independently of which he is a person of some substance. Has been absent from his Farm since Friday or Saturday last. Is supposed to have been lately in the neighbourhood of Ringwood in Hampshire and was concerned in the late riots in the County of Wilts.

This man is a dissenter.

From the following letter it would appear that both men were wrong, the farmer involved was in fact Samuel Alford.

1. Letter from Lord Arundell. (HO52/11 folios 162- 164)

Wardour Castle Dec^r 6 1830

My Lord,

I presume to address yr Lordship on a subject connected with the late riots in this Parish. Attempts have been made to connect with them a tenant of mine Mr Samuel Alford and y^r Lordship is aware that he has absconded from a Warrant to apprehend him.

I think it my duty to state what I know on the subject from the best evidence I can collect since my return to this place from duty with my Troop at Salisbury

On Wednesday the 24th Nov^r (a meeting of the Parish of Tisbury having been previously summoned for 4 o'clock on Thursday the 25th) some of the principal Land Occupiers in the Parish viz Mr Coombes renting under me and under Mr Wyndham Esq^r, Mr Bristol, tenant to Sir H Parker, Mess^{rs} Maton & Grey two of the Overseers also large Farmers met at Mr Samuel Alford's to take into consideration what proposal they should make on the following day to the Labourers as to increase of wages. Mr Jay the third Overseer who is Land Bailiff to John Benett Esq^r had engaged also to attend this meeting but was prevented by business.

At this meeting nothing was discussed but this subject on the following morning the 25th Mr Alford rode from his Farm to Tisbury, 1 ½ mile distant having heard from his Labourers that a mob was formed on his arrival he learnt it had proceeded to the New Factory built by the late Mr Farquhar, a mile distant; arrived there he entreated the People to disist from destroying it in which he was joined by Mr Ja^s Coombes agent to the Proprietor, they succeeded, on

that occasion he desired the mob to move on, which circumstance has been given in Evidence against him as showing that he could command them.

The mob proceeded to destroy a thrashing machine belonging to Mr Turner a farmer in a neighbouring Parish. Alford followed them there. The machine was then nearly destroyed Mr Turner was present & Alford enquired of him whether it was done with his consent he replied in the affirmative. Alford then returned home and after dinner went to the appointed Vestry at Tisbury Church. The mob it appears afterwards destroyed the machines of two or three other farmers in Fonthill Parish & then proceeded to Mr Benetts at Pythouse where they came into conflict with the Yeomanry this is three miles from Tisbury Church & four miles from Alford's Farm.

Four or Five farmers only attended the Vestry and no business was done. There he was told, some expressions of his had been reported as implicating him, he is a very (?) & timid man and was much alarmed, so much so, that he could not be prevailed upon to come to Salisbury next day whither I had with the concurrence of Col. Mair & Lord Radnor, invited him to attend to explain himself. He is a single man living with an Elderly Sister, and one of his Relations informs me was in such a state if distraction at the report that they feared he would lose his senses, although he constantly declares his innocence.

In this state his friend removed him from the Country I believe to London.

I know the man well I am in constant communication with him and consult him as the most sensible, prudent, & humane man on my Estate.

Catholics and Dissenters have (occasioned?) this Disturbance. Altho among the 40 men taken 4 only were Catholics, & two only of the committed one of whom is not a frequenter of any place of worship but christened a Catholic.

Mr Alford is a Dissenter of a Congregation of Independents which have existed on my Estate ever since the Civil War and held their Meeting House of my Family.

Inclosed to y^r Lordship (note in pencil added – not inclosed) a letter from Alford to me where he is, I know not. I believe in London. I beg y^r Lordship to inform me whether you would direct me to advise his family to deliver himself up to

you. I would willingly prevail upon him to do so & wait upon you, with him if he will consent and I hope he would do so. For his appearance I am sure Bail to any amount may be had.

I request your Lordship to excuse the trouble I give you in my desire to serve a man for whose honesty & innocence of this charge I would almost stake my existence. I have the honor to be

2. Letter from Samuel Alford to Lord Arundell, Wardour (TNA - HO52/11 folios 165-166) My Lord,

Your honorable and very kind interference on my behalf has stamped a sense of gratitude in my heart that nothing but death will ever efface.

With regards to the reports and information given against me, I know not what to say. I was greatly alarmed, fearing they would resort to the dreadful measures through the Country of burning property, and under the influence of that alarm I fear I used some unguarded expressions respecting machinery, and that another expression which referred solely to the contemplated rise in wages, namely "Success to you my lads" may have been used against me. This expression arose from what passed the day before when I passed by as some of them were working upon the road near my farm and complained of great distress, - I told them that a vestry was called for Thursday and that a considerable rise in their wages would be made. - I wished them to attend in the Churchyard at 4 o'clock and state their complaints to the Vestry, that was to take place next morning, and had not the most distant hint but that all my men were coming to work - I had proposed to take in a wheat rick but to my surprise not one of my men came but the carters, - I asked them what they meant to do, but had no answer. I told them, if they staid at home I would pay them for their days work; but that if they went I would not give them a farthing, and that their wages should be raised to the same as the others if they staid at home; but they all went off.

Now so far from inflaming the Mob, I waited in Tisbury Street till I saw they had got near Fonthill factory, when I

rode off at full speed and reached the spot soon enough to exhort them by every argument not to commit any violence on any person or property, they left the factory and said they would go on to Mr Turner's threshing machine, for they said he had given them leave to beat it to pieces. They proceeded accordingly, I rode after, through Ashley wood for the purpose of ascertaining whether it was so. - When I arrived they had nearly destroyed the machine. - Mr Turner sat upon his horse looking on. I asked him whether it was done by his consent. -He answered yes. I then turned my horse and rode home, and never saw one of them from that time to this. In the afternoon I proceeded to the Church at the appointed time to meet the Vestry when to my great disappointment only about four or five persons met. We assisted these about two hours, when I learnt that a serious riot had taken place at Pyt House. I was then told by a respectable inhabitant, that Mr Benett was enraged against me, in consequence of some statement that had been made to him to my prejudice. I therefore thought it prudent to withdraw myself till the matter could be calmly investigated.

To the truth of the foregoing statement I beg to assure your Lordship that, I am most ready to make oath.

My Lord,

I have to acknowledge the receipt of yr Lordship's letter of the 7th Inst.

I shall immediately inform the relations of Mr Alford of your Lordship's opinion that he ought to surrender himself but without meaning to insinuate any thing against the Magistrate who issued the Warrant who is my relation & a most honorable man, my impression is that in the belief that violent prejudices exist against him which are occasioned by (party?) feelings he will decline doing so at present.

HARDING John, of Tisbury

John Harding, of Tisbury, was the only fatality in the Wiltshire Riots. He was among the men at the clash between the rioters and the Hindon Troop, at Pythouse, and was shot dead, but there is some debate as to who it was who actually killed him. At the inquest into his death a witness, not named, described how he saw Harding holding on to the reins of one of the horses, ridden by a member of the Hindon Troop, with his left hand and striking the rider with the club stick he held in the other hand. He supposedly continued this attack for about five minutes before the

yeoman drew his pistol and fired the fatal shot. The jury brought a verdict of 'Justifiable Homicide', and as a result of this the coroner is reported to have felt that he could not grant a warrant for Harding's burial.

W H Hudson gives a version of the events in his book, *A Shepherd's Life*.

'When the troops appeared the 'rioters', as they were called, made off into the woods and escaped; but before they fled one of them had met his death. A number of persons from the farms and villages around had gathered at the spot and were looking on, when one, a farmer from the neighbouring village of Chilmark, snatched a gun from a gamekeeper's hand and shot one of the rioters, killing him dead.'

According to William Turner's account of the affray, Harding was shot by a West Knoyle Trooper. John Brickle's account would seem to agree that Harding was shot by one of the Cavalry men.

John Brickle gives the following account of John Harding's death.

'They slashed 'em about awful and one man her were just agetting up into wood when one of the Cavalry did let off his horse pistol and shot 'im – The bullet did go in at back of his head and out t'other side – His name were Harding – he were brother to Butcher's father down at Hatch – What became of his body? Why his people lived up Knoyle and they come and arried 'im home and he do lay up Knoyle churchyard now he do.'

(Wiltshire & Swindon Archives – 413/23.) See below for a transcript of John Brickle's account and for full transcripts of William Turner's accounts of the riot)

The truth of Harding's death will probable never be known, but the Coroner at least had a change of heart, as the following entry appears in the Tisbury burial register:-

John Harding, of Tisbury Lane, buried 29 November 1830; shot in an affray. Verdict at the Coroner's Inquest Felo de se.

No age is given for John Harding in the burial register but it seems possibly that he was the John Harding who was baptised at Tisbury on 16 September 1798, son of William & Jane Harding.

BRICKLE John, of Tisbury

Strictly speaking John Brickle was not a rioter, but he did play his part in the riots, and has left us his account of what took place.

The Story of the Battle of Pythouse from an Eyewitness (Wiltshire & Swindon Archives – 413/23) John Brickle, November 1883.

Tell 'ee about the fight up at Pythouse, ess sur, of course I can. - Lets zee, t'were just fifty three years ago - come November next. I were a strong lusty chap then. May be t'were about eleven o'clock. I were with the Squire's six horses hauling stone up from Lawn Quarry, to make a new road to West Lodge, by t'abbey when they did come along oh, a lot on 'em. I should think 900 men. They wanted I to join em and they said they should take my horses. – I zaid – where them horses goes, I goes – so I went up in the midst on 'em with two of th'horses and some of 'em rode to their 'omes. Zum of 'em were awful drunk. When they got up to Home Farm - they set to and id smash up the "drashing machines" and got up on roof, and broke all the zlates and tiles and made awful work.- there - they were for all the world like mad folk. - Then 'old Squire he did ride up along wi' Mr Legge the steward (terrible nice old man he were) he were a broken down gentlemen he were - one of the mob did throw a brick at he - and knocked 'im off his horse they did and stunned 'im.- 'nother stone hit the Squire and his face were all covered with blood but there he did try and persuade 'em not to carry on, there he did talk beautiful, but t'were no good, they were all mad drunk more or less. They talked of going down to Mansion - and setting house a'fire but Mr Benett he had his men there with loaded fire arms, about twenty on 'em and the mob they were afeard - so they did march along across the park and went down to Linley and I followed 'em.- They smashed up everything there – and made dreadful havoc and took the Beer barrel out of Bailiff's house, and knocked the bung out and got more drunk, and they couldn't smash the big bar of the machine - till one of 'em said, - here - let I try - and he zmashed 'im in one blow. He were a blacksmith you see he were - and - and he did know just where to hit 'im - he did - There his name were Turner and he got transported for life. Then just as they were coming up Park to Pythhouse the cavalry did come - There - they did

gallop splendid and the mob they made for the plantation, but some of 'em did "voight" wonderful – armed were they? – Oh! Yes they had all manner of Iron bars and great sticks and all sorts. But the Cavalry they lay about 'em wonderful There - they slashed 'em about awful and one man were just getting into wood when one of the Cavalrymen did let off his horse pistil and shot 'im – The bullet did go in at back of his head and out t'other side – His name were Harding – he were brother to Butcher's father down at Hatch What became of his body? Why his people lived up Knoyle and they come and arried 'im home and he do lay up Knoyle churchyard now he do. Mr Benett he did beg of the Cavalry not to fire, he said he didn't want no man killed but there - they did fire - lots of 'em - Mr Wyndham he did command 'em - and then they surrounded 'em - and took 'em all - and we had to get our farm horses and wagons and take them to Salisbury - and the blood did trickle out of the Wagons – the whole way to Salisbury – I was carter – and drove the first wagon – When we got to Black Horse at Chilmark they did cry out for summat to drink poor Fellows but the Cavalry wouldn't let 'em have nothing - They wouldn't. It were awful cold night and they were most shramm'd with the frost - and some of 'em couldn't wag a bit. - When we got to Salisbury we took one load to the Firmary and t'others to jail. There were special Zizes there were and they tacked a fortnight - lots of 'em got transported – some for life – some for 20 years. There - It was a bad job - Who were the ring leaders? - Well he were one - of Ansty he were - but they never took 'un I heard as how they searched all Lunnon though to find 'un. But there - they didn't ever catch 'un and haow be young Master John zur? And I do wish you'd have summat done to my front door. Goodnight zur and thank 'ee for calling.

John Brickle was my great grandfather carter he died circa 1884 at 97.

John Brickle was amongst those who received a reward of £85 for his part in informing against and identifying the prisoners who took part in the affray at Pythouse.

May it please your Majesty

The undersigned your Majesty's dutiful and Loyal subjects residing in the Town and neighbourhood of Ludgershall in the County of Wilts, do approach your Majesty with the warmest feelings of affection and attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person Family and Government.

Your Majesty's humble Petitioners do deeply lament the Disturbances, and Conflagrations which have occurred in different parts of the Country for the last few months, but they have heard with great regret that Henry Wilkins has been left for execution at Salisbury for setting fire to a Cottage near this Town in November last, because it was almost uninhabitable, and there is no proportion between its loss and the loss of his Life and the circumstances of this case differ from other instances of arson which have occurred in as much as the Act was not committed with malice in a Secret manner, but in public at a moment of great public irritation and rather resembles those cases of outrage where property to a much larger amount was destroyed and where the Royal Mercy has been exercised.

A Barn in the same yard with the above Cottage was discovered to be on Fire during the late disturbances and the person who lived three miles distant with many others from

all the Country round, were drawn to the spot; but it is not so much as suspected he was concerned in this first act. This family residing in the Cottage having removed, and taken away their Goods, a feeling rose and was expressed by too many, that it ought to be burned in order to prevent any human being from dwelling again in such a wretched place and under the false and delusive impression the fatal act was committed.

Your Majesty's humble Petitioners acknowledge such a deed ought to be severely punished but consider the infliction of Death too severe a punishment, and therefore do most earnestly implore, that your Majesty's Royal Clemency may be so far extended towards the Guilty and unhappy criminal that his life may be spared.

And your Majesty's humble petitioners will ever pray as in duty bound etc

My Lord,

The favour I have received from your Lordship as a Protestant Dissenter encourages me to forward to your Lordship the enclosed Petition to the King in behalf of Henry Wilkins who is left for Execution at Salisbury on Tuesday next.

I am a stranger to the man and his family, nor do I know he ever entering a Dissenting place of Worship, but I feel deeply interested in his fate on Benevolent and Public grounds, and do most earnestly implore your Lordship to give the case consideration, and if your Lordship can do with a sense of Duty, not only forward it in the proper Channel, but with your Lordships recommendation.

I can assure your Lordship that the Cottage referred to was in the most deplorable sate. It containing four windows, but had only 3 panes of Glass, while between the door ports, and the Walls there were spaces almost, sufficient to admit a child in doors, and I feel quite persuaded that the Cottage would not have been burned if the sight of it in such a state had not instigated numbers of thoughtless persons, in a

moment of dreadful excitement, among whom were very many young & the unhappy prisoner, to act in so wicked and inconsiderate manner - had the deed been committed in a secret and malicious way I should have felt pity but remained silent

I do humbly entreat Your Lordship to consider whether in this instance, as the Prisoner has been tried and found Guilty, and left under sentence of Death, the ends of Public Justice will not be fully answered by his being transported for life so it appears to the neighbourhood in general and that the public feeling will be more conciliatory, and the peace of the neighbourhood better promoted by the Exercise of mercy than by the Extreme penalty of the Law.

The Petition is signed by all the Yeoman in this place except one all the tradesmen, and expresses the feeling of every person with the above exception, it is also signed by the Yeomen tradesmen & many Inhabitants of Chute where the prisoner tended, and hundreds more signatures could be procured if the scattered state of the neighbourhood and the shortness of time had permitted.

Samuel Banstone

Previous Convictions

Samuel Banstone, age 18, committed by W Wyndham for the space of 3 months, he having been convicted of an offence against the game laws. Warrant dated 3 March 1808. (W&S Archives A1/125/46BB)

Lent Assizes 1827

Samuel Banstone (alias Macey) age 36, Thomas Banstone (alias Macey) age 24, and Charles Lovatt age 21, charged on the oath of John Turner with having in combination with others, at present unknown, assaulted the said John Turner, on the high road and feloniously stolen from his person a purse, containing monies, his property, at Fonthill Gifford. Warrant dated November 8 1826. (W&S Archives A1/125/53A)

John Pounds

John Pounds gives his native place as Berkshire, and committed his offence at Ramsbury. I have been unable to find the baptism of a John Pounds in either Berkshire or Wiltshire. I have recently found a possible explanation for this and have given below his possible parentage, but would stress that this has not yet been fully checked.

When looking at the 1841 Census for Ramsbury I noticed a William and Elizabeth Pounds living in Mill Lane. They were also there in the 1851 and 1861 census. In both of these William gave his place of birth as Chilton, Wiltshire and Elizabeth's as Lambourn in Berkshire. I then found a marriage of a William Pounds to an Elizabeth Perry in Lambourn in 1813, but still no baptism for a John Pounds, but there was a baptism of a John, son of Elizabeth Perry at Lambourn in 1810. Could this be the John Pounds who was transported in 1831? If it is this seems a possible family for him.

John Perry/Perris & Jane Martin were married 5 July 1789, Lambourn, Berkshire.

William & Elizabeth Pounds appear to have moved from Lambourn to Ramsbury at some time after their marriage. They appear to have had al least 3 other children, all born at Ramsbury, William, born about 1814 and Mary Anne, baptised 15 September 1816, and Elizabeth, baptised 20 July 1823. Mary Ann Pounds had a son, George Edwards Pounds, baptised at Ramsbury, 23 February 1834. This is possibly the George Pounds who was living with William & Elizabeth Pounds in 1841. In 1851 there is a George Pounds age 17, described a nephew of Alfred Pounds, living at with him and his family at Lambourn in Berkshire. Alfred gives his place of birth at Ramsbury.
